

Christmas Ship Huge Success, Hall

Oregon's people did everything in their power to fill their share of the Northwest Christmas Ship. Governor Hall told the Christmas Ship Coordinators, Rev. Gilbert B. Christian, and representatives of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies Foreign Service, licensed agencies to distribute food in the state. George W. Miles and L. Saxon, at a meeting in the state capitol Friday to discuss Christmas Ship activities in the state of Oregon.

With a gratifying twenty carloads to date promised by the people of Oregon to swell the ranks of the Northwest Christmas Ship and these representing but part of Oregon's potential contribution, the Rev. Christian said, "If the people continue to contribute in this grand fashion, Oregon not only will be proud of its Christmas spirit but will go on record as having saved the lives of many unfortunate European children."

Representing some sixty voluntary relief agencies, Mr. Miles on behalf of suffering people overseas and these volunteer relief agencies, thanked the people

of Oregon for the splendid work they are doing.

Long Beach, Wash., 10 tons of miscellaneous food stuffs.

Pendleton, 1 carload canned peas, 1,000 lbs. of dried peas.

Heppner, Umatilla, 1 carload wheat.

Union County, 1 carload flour. Klamath Falls, 1 carload canned milk.

Portland, 3 carloads of miscellaneous foods.
