Yet, above all, we've had a jovial holiday season and we're ready and eager to begin on the second portion of the year.

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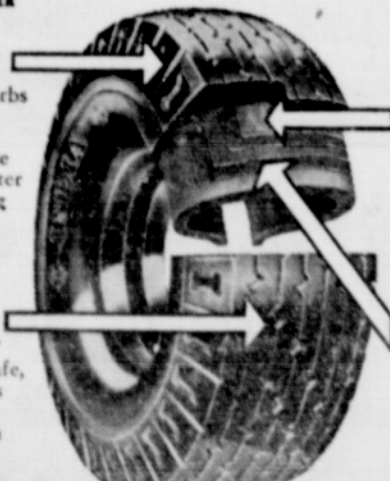
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
