

Livestock Meetings Set In Curry County

Harvey Crook, President of the Curry County Livestock Association, just announced the annual meeting of the association for January 29. It will be held at Gold Beach as usual, with committee meetings before noon and the business session in the afternoon.

A Rural Service Committee will be named this year to study and make recommendations on transportation, telephone and power service in the rural areas.

Dog control will be given major attention along with predatory animal control. Last year a standing committee was named to serve throughout the year and report at the next meeting. J. H. Turner, Chairman, W. W. Ostrander and Will White were named on the dog control committee and will report on their accomplishments.

Marketing, breed improvement, Lamb and wool show reports will also be studied by committees. Approved reports will be published after the meeting.

Four directors will be elected to serve two years to take the place of directors whose terms expire this year. Harvey Crook, S. J. Spoerl, R. G. McKenzie and David Crockett are the retiring members of the board. Raymond Camps, R. H. McCall and M. L. DeMartin will serve for another year.

The Western Oregon Livestock Association which now includes eleven county associations will hold its annual meeting at Roseburg this year. The date is February 13 and 14. A delegation will be sent from Curry County to attend.

Camp White Asked As Veterans Home

Acting on the assumption that the state of Oregon has abandoned the idea of acquiring Camp White army hospital for a mental institution, the state Department of Veterans' Affairs advisory committee is gathering forces in an effort to turn the hospital into a Veterans Administration

domiciliary facility for war veterans of the Northwest. Committee Chairman John Walker Jones of Milwaukie has disclosed.

Jones said that the advisory committee in its recent quarterly meeting passed a resolution urging "the governor of Oregon, other state officials and the press to join forces with the veteran organizations in a concerted effort to acquire the Camp White army hospital at Medford for a veterans' domiciliary home."

The seven man group, composed of veteran organization members and one public member appointed by the governor to oversee Department of Veterans' Affairs policy, took this move immediately after the recent attorney general opinion ruling out the possibility of the state's acquiring the hospital.

Members stressed the fact that there have been no veteran domiciliary facilities in the north west since before World War 2 and that Oregon years ago turned its own veterans' home in Roseburg over to the Veterans Administration, which is still using it as a hospital.

Other proponents already have been able to get a bill into Congress which would establish the camp as a veterans' domiciliary home with hospital facilities. The efforts of all influential groups in Oregon will be needed to secure passage of this bill, Jones declared.

Other advisory committee members concurring in this resolution were Robert W. Bryant, Roland W. Davis, Ray Dorris, Cary F. Freilinger and Harry V. Reed.
