Brookings Dumps Port Orford Fives

Brookings Bruins, continuing their winning ways, Friday, took three from Port Orford high with no particular difficulty even in the main game, which Brookings won 28 to 23.

One for Ripley is the game between the two second teams. Port Orford, looking like champions, made the Brookings boys look as lifeless as an undertaker's hand-shake. At the half, with a 14 to 9 lead, Brookings appeared headed for an ignominious defeat.

In the secrecy of the locker room, known best to players and coaches, Coach Guthrie revamped his team in some manner—did the job so well that even the dads of the lads didn't recognize them at the start of the third quarter. The elixir he gave his proteges would net him a fortune if other coaches could learn the formula.

Behind five points, at the start of the third quarter, the Bruins looked more like a collegiate team, as they immediately opened the gate to scoring, likes of which has never been seen in Curry County since Jason Lee and his followers moved into Oregon via the covered wagon. In less than a minute Brookings had the score tied at 17-all, and

from then on, Port Orford lads were merely spectators to one of the greatest displays of raining basketballs they'll ever see. In the quarter, Brookings poured in 30 points while Port Orford added three.

With Grosbeck and Reekman hawking the ball after each score most of these points were made through just plain Dillinger tactics of thievery. Either one of these lads would catch the throw-in, the other would score on a lay-in. This went on and on until finally Port Orford woke up and put the third man back in the court to stop this rout. With still much of the third quarter left, Guthrie began substituting, but the score rose steadily despite his trying to stop the act of "pouring it on".
