Cliff Robinson, State Superintendent for the State Department of Education visited the Brookings High School, Tuesday, he spent the greater part of the day in the building. Full report from the State Department is expected soon.

Among suggestions voiced by Robinson while he was here was the major issue of space. Brookings must in the very near future provide for the growth of high school population. The school rooms which the school now has are sub-standard in size.

The library set up is absolutely satisfactory since it must be used as a classroom as well as a study-hall. It is almost certain that the State Department will not approve continuation of Shop nor the addition of Home Economics to the curriculum, unless adequate space is provided.

The high school is about as fully handicapped in the size of the rooms which it now has in the number. It is almost certain that the State Department would not approve the setting up of Shop in the basement.

Since there is a growing demand on the part of students and parents for Home Economics, the Budget board included appropriations for a Home Economics teacher and Home Ec. equipment in the budget. It is to be hoped that a solution may be found in the space problem.

N. Turnbull, building consultant for the state department of education has been invited to come down in the very near future to advise with the district as to the best solution.
