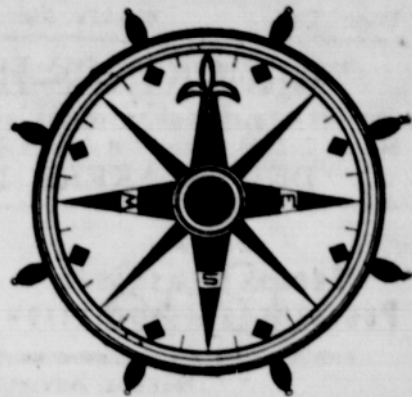

Half Of Fund Is Raised For Scouts

In answer to the appeal, last week, almost half of the necessary \$200 fund for this community has been raised by voluntary donations, varying from \$5 to \$25. This fund, necessary to pay the area's share of the regional scout director, is being raised by the various scout committees of the area, and is payable to the regional headquarters at Eugene. The Cub committee is composed of T. S. Abbott, Archie Henricks and Homer Haggarty, with Ben Kerns as Cubmaster and George Widney, assistant. The scout committee is composed of Charles Low, Nick Neufeld, Bob Perkins, Mike Page and Wey Akers, with John Ginther as scoutmaster and Brad Tillotson assisting.

Scouts Honored At Services, Sunday

Members of Troop 32, Boy Scouts of America and Pack 332, Cub Scouts, were honored locally in observance of national boy scout week, Sunday at the Baptist community church, at special services.

"What Makes a Man" was the subject of the sermon by Rev. Nick Neufeld, himself a committeeman for the scouts. In prefacing his remarks, he briefly reviewed the history of the scouting movement, and pointed out what, in his judgement makes it possible for scouts to become men of distinction.

"The scout oath and law are firm foundations on which to base any training of young men. Years of this teaching have produced results which stand out to prove the value of scouting to the future of the world.

"In the late war, it was the leadership gained through scouting that gave all branches of the armed services nearly all their officers. These men were chosen for the these duties because of their knowledge of fundamental facts."

In the opening of the services the scouts and cubs presented their colors, and marched into the church in a body, to a reserved section for the boys.

Gold Beach Wins; Brookings "In"

In the final games of the county league, Friday, while Brookings drew a bye, Langlois romped over Port Orford easily in a game which had no particular bearing on the league standing. The game between Ophir and Gold Beach, at the county seat, was of extreme importance to the title, and was won by Gold Beach, thus permitting the Brookings Bruins to gain the championship without a playoff.

In her win over Port Orford the week previously, the Bruins gained a half-game advantage over Ophir, who was tied for the league lead with Brookings. An Ophir win Friday, would have brought them back into a tie for the title.

With rivalry as intense between these two as it is between Gold Beach and Brookings, Gold Beach wanted to be in a tie with Ophir for second place honors, and did so by winning in a heater battle 23 to 22.

Bruins Split Pair At Florence, Sat.

With all their games played in the county competition, the local Bruins A and B squads journeyed to Florence last Saturday in a non-conference schedule and came away with a split decision, the Bs losing to the hosts while the main game went to the Bruin squad, 51 to 48.

After having played all season against competition which enjoyed bodily contact, the Bruins found themselves heavily fouled on the Florence floor, and this fact kept the host team in the game as 20 of the 24 foul shots were made by Florence. Through his work, and especially his labor on the projects placed before the interim committee, Jan. 22, at Coquille, Coos county enthusiasts have also signified willingness to further the candidacy of Mr. Grayshel in that area.

Curry and Coos county will be represented well if Mr. Grayshel should win the election, inasmuch as he certainly would let Salem know such a territory existed in the state of Oregon.
