Ellsworth Reports On Harbor Bills

Those interested in the harbor improvement and river mouth projects, locally, will be interested in this week's column by Harris Ellsworth, 4th District Representative to Congress. In his "Letter From Washington" Mr. Ellsworth tells of his efforts to have sufficient appropriations made this year to carry out this much need work.

Rep. Ellsworth points out that to delay these projects would be not only to deny the usefulness of the completed work, but will also result in much greater expense in the cost of the work itself. He states that the action of the House of Representatives is not final, as the Senate is likely to increase such appropriations. Meanwhile he states that he will fight for these items with all his ability.

The Smith River Co-operative Creamery directors and members held their first annual meeting on February 6, at the community hall, with an all-day session. Dinner was served at noon by ladies of the local church. President Henry Westbrook Jr. was in charge of the business session, assisted by Secretary Oliver Bailey.

Mr. Elliott, auditor for the co-operative plant, gave the financial report for the first three months the plant had been in operation, since its purchase from Golden State Creamery. William K. Owen, manager of the newly organized creamery, gave a report of the re-arrangement that had been planned and addition of new equipment which will result in more economical operation. He reports a new all-alum-

inum butter churn has been installed to replace the two wooden ones. Plans are being made to purchase a new automatic boiler to replace the oil burner now used by the creamery.

Gilbert Wademan, dairy inspector, spoke on importance of cooling milk, in keeping down bacteria. He stated many dairymen are adding milk-cooling systems to their own dairy equipment. Bill Spangler of Vonson Feed Co. of Eureka stated there was a drop in all commodity prices which is a good picture for the dairymen. The present directors retained for the coming year:
