We are having the third grade in our room for the party Friday as a thank you for the room they let us have. We are going to have Dixie cups to eat.

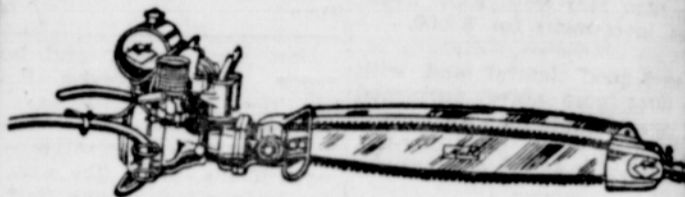
Cub Scout Den
