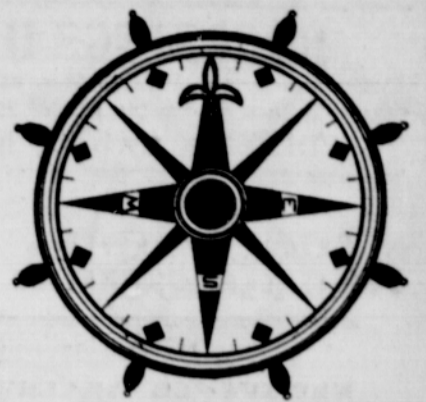

Nat'l Show Will Feature This Area

Bruins Won County Tourney, Saturday

The Bruins to prove that winning the county championship is no fluke, went out and won it last Friday and Saturday evenings, when they romped off with the county tournament honors. Drawing Ophir Friday evening, the Bruins showed superiority to win 44 to 31. Pacing Rausch with 13 and Church with 11, the Bruins had to fight back from a 22 to 19 half-time deficit to gain the right to play Gold Beach.

Elderly Man Died At Harbor, Sunday

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at the Baptist Community church for George E. Anderson, who died Sunday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. E. Hanscam, Sr., at the age of 82. Rev. N. N. Neufend had charge of services with interment at the Brookings cemetery.

Born in Santa Clara county, California, in 1864, he resided there for a number of years before coming to Oregon. In November, 1889, he was married to Agnes Clossner at Jacksonville, Oregon. To this union were born five children.

A few years ago he moved from Grants Pass to the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. E. Hanscam. Surviving are: three daughters, Mrs. E. E. Hanscam and Mrs. Fred Reiling of Harbor, and Mrs. Tom Young of Fairbanks, Alaska; two sons, Fred and Archie Anderson of Harbor; 16 grandchildren and 21 great-grandchildren.

Fred Adams Files In Race For Representative from Curry Co.

Almost three weeks ago, when Morton Tompkins, state Grange master, was in this area, he stated that Fred Adams would definitely not seek re-election, and wished that local people would urge him to reconsider. The same day, it was reported, Mr. Adams told Charles Grayshel he would not seek re-election. On this assurance, Mr. Grayshel agreed to friends sending in his filing fee.

People of this area, friends of Adams, and also backing Grayshel's candidacy, were shocked to read the last week's issue of the Curry County Reporter, to learn that Adams, too was filing. Many of these, warm friends of Mr. Adams, find that they have agreed to further Charles Grayshel's campaign, and feel hurt that this situation has arisen.

The following taken from the Coos Bay Times, tells of Mr. Grayshel's progress in that county:

His intention to file for the republican nomination for joint Coos-Curry county representative was announced in Coos Bay Thursday afternoon by Charles Grayshel, owner of the Coffee Mill restaurant in Brookings.

Grayshel Assured By Adams
Grayshel said he had been told by Fred Adams, incumbent, of near Ophir, that he will not be a candidate to succeed himself.

Grayshel has been a Brookings businessman the past three and a half years. He moved there from Portland where he was owner of the Columbia Gorge Motor company and the Victor Cartage company.

Grayshel has been an Oregon resident for 30 years, with three years "time out" spent in Washington, D. C., in the budget and auditing department of the immigration and naturalization ser-

vice. He worked for two years in Portland in cost accounting and field work for the army engineers and a year for the navy doing cost inspection work. For seven years he was credit manager of the Ford Motor company in Portland.

Active Community Worker
Grayshel is chairman of the Brookings Chamber of Commerce roads committee, and as such represented his community before a recent legislative interim committee at Coquille. He has been a director of the Oregon Coast association for two years. He is vice-president of the Croft Lily Growers association and vice-president of the Brookings chamber of commerce.

Grayshel visited with a number of republicans on Coos Bay Thursday afternoon. He said he will mail his declaration of candidacy at once.
