

Doctor Explains Hospital Needs

"Can any small community afford a hospital?" said Dr. Raymond L. Erickson, before the Rotary club, Tuesday, "should be made to read: Can any community afford not to have one." In explaining his interests in the matter, Dr. Erickson told about seeking federal funds for a proposed hospital for this county, and his findings.

Federal funds are available in a ratio of about one federal dollar for every two raised by the community, but the strings attached make it impossible to run the institution for a profit, and results largely in the hospital being poorly managed for lack of profit.

In closing, Dr. Erickson said that every community should have a hospital of whatever size for the institution meant much to the general welfare.

Oregon Boy and Girl Win 4-H Award

Two state 4-H club awards for leadership and achievement were announced in Portland Wednesday by Elwain Greenweed, secretary of the Oregon Bankers association. Names of the two winners are Donna Wiederkehr, 17, of Jefferson and Richard Larkin, 18 of Monroe.

Donna Wiederkehr was presented with the Bankers trophy. Richard Larkin was given the Governor Patterson trophy. The Patterson award is named in memory of the late governor of Oregon. Both young 4-H club members were recognized as outstanding in the fields of leadership and achievement in Oregon.

Speaking of leadership and achievement, listen to Donna Wiederkehr's record: In 9 years of 4-H club work she has never missed a meeting of any of her clubs. During the past 5 years she has acted as leader for 8 home economics 4-H clubs made up of girls her age or younger. Each of the 8 clubs has completed its projects 100 percent.

In her own right, Donna Wiederkehr has completed a total of 87 4-H club projects. L. J. Allen, state 4-H club leader, says 87 projects is a remarkable total in itself.

But that isn't all to Donna's story: She is an "A" student in high school and belongs to the high school honor society. She finds time to act as president of her high school entomology club and is secretary of the science club.

Music is important too. Donna plays the accordian, piano and oboe. All of which adds up to lots of activity for a 17-year old 4-H club girl. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Wiederkehr of Jefferson.

Now, about Richard Larkin: He won the Governor Patterson trophy for leadership and achievement.

During 8 years of 4-H club work, Richard Larkin has completed a total of 25 projects in the fields of livestock, crops, health and woodworking. Since 1945 he has acted as leader for 7 4-H clubs. In 1946 and 1947 he was president of the senior 4-H club of Benton county.

Among a long list of awards which young Larkin has received, he was champion sheep showman of the 1947 state fair. He placed second as a sheep showman at the 1947 Pacific International in Portland.

He is now a freshman at Oregon state college. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harold Larkin, operate a 500-acre farm near Monroe in southern Benton county.
