Hello There:

There have been three cotton dress workshops held in the county this year. This workshop served every community, giving all who were interested a chance to participate in them. There was a total attendance of thirty-two women who made eighteen dresses—working for the most part, two women to a dress. Special helps were given in bound button holes, zipper plackets and fitting problems. There were requests for help in making basic patterns for hard to fit figures. Such a meeting can be included in next years home extension unit program if there is sufficient demand for it at program planning day in May.

National 4-H club week is the week after next. There are more than three hundred 4-H club members in this county. That's a good reason for us to give them recognition during their week.

Are you thinking of buying a vacuum cleaner? There are two standard types of vacuum cleaners—the tank type and the upright. Either one will do a job for you, but they will not do the same cleaning job. The upright is made primarily to clean heavy rugs. It cleans by brushing and suction, and in some models a beating action also. Other uses of an upright cleaner are extras, for it is awkward to carry about and hard to use the attachments. Its main use becomes cleaning floor rugs. The tank type cleaner is best suited to all around house cleaning, including dusting. The cleaner is light weight and easy to carry upstairs. The tank type cleaner is only a suction cleaner. It will be less effective on heavy rugs, but it has many added uses. The homemaker's problem is to decide what the main cleaning

problem is in her home and then choose a cleaner to suit it.

Something new in vacuum cleaners! Have you seen the new cleaners that scrub floors with soap and water and then suck the soapsuds up from the floor? This cleaner will do your rugs and other cleaning jobs, too. It is similar to the tank-type of cleaner. The machine is encased in a handy portable container. The dirt and dust or water, are drawn through the nozzle and deposited in a water bath within the cleaner. This removes all dust from the circulation while you are using the cleaner. The "bag" is emptied by pouring out the water.

Bert DeMoss Hurts Back In Lifting

While helping service a car late Wednesday, Bert DeMoss, operator of the Texaco Service Station, hurt his lower back, and is in the Crescent City hospital, unable to do more than move his hands.

The several X-Ray pictures taken of his back have been sent away for study by an expert spine doctor. When a reply is received, treatment will be followed to correct the injury, which is said to have cracked one vertebra, in addition to dislocation.

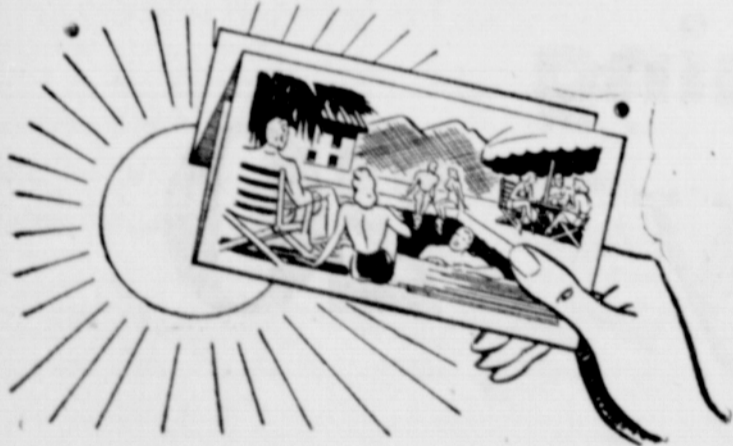
