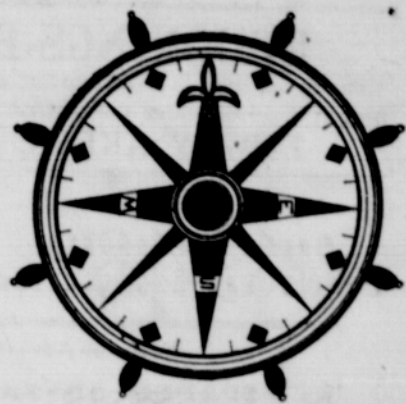

A. O. Schmitt Tells of European Countries

Dr. A. O. Schmitt, who spent most a year at postgraduate study of medicine in Europe, some years ago, told the Rotarians, Tuesday, why there were many philosophies on that continent today. He traced the origins of the peoples of each nation, and from this origin, together with environments to result in nations and creeds. Ben Kerns told the club of the need for a class 1 airport, and of the government and state support available. Bus Lines Denied An Interstate Franchise

San Francisco—The Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C. Feb. 26 released a decision of a joint board recommending denial of the American Buslines' application for interstate rights on the coast route between Los Angeles, California and Portland, Oregon.

The Public Utilities commission of California also denied applications of the American Buslines to operate local service along the same routes in California.

Lightning Strikes Sarver Home, Fri.

Lightning, which accompanied Friday's storm, struck the Sarver home, on Easy street, doing an undetermined amount of damage to not only the house, but to all wiring and electrical appliances.

According to Mrs. C. H. Rausch who discovered lightning playing on the radio aerial leading into the house, there was a terrible crash, near the chimney, where a gaping hole now appears.

Mrs. Sarver was at Klamath Falls at the time, and her son, staying home at the time, had just left for town. The fire department's immediate action saved the building, which was literally filled with small spot fires.

Following the wiring of the building, the lightning destroyed the radio, as well as all the wiring. A spot fire on the floor, burned to within an inch of a box of shotgun shells and a quantity of black powder.

A window was blown from the house to a distance of 30 feet, a watch lying in the bedroom, had its crystal broken by concussion. Other freak damages were done in the building.

Quality, Not Price, Wanted In Lilies

In following up his talk of last week, George Funk told the Pilot Monday that greenhouses and florists were not as much interested in the price of bulbs as they are in the quality. Bulbs that are dependable, have been raised under the best conditions controlled by man, and which have been properly pre-cooled are the ones sought by the greenhouse and trade.

Croft lilies, it has been learned, have become popular as cut flowers, and therein lies the fact that quality must be foremost. Inferior bulbs do not produce the number and desired blooms for this branch of the trade. Pre-cooling, properly and conscientiously done by the growers, is an important factor in this aim of cut flower raisers.

Superior lilies, those which the greenhouse men can rely on for performance, will be the sole reason for survival of the lily industry. The trade will be willing to pay over the market price for such bulbs.

Mr. Funk revealed to the Pilot that he had sent a case of bulbs to the University of Oklahoma experiment station, and had received a glowing report on their performance. It must also be remembered that Mr. Funk's display at the 1947 Oakland flower show, stole sweepstakes money.

Clyde Edward Hayes was born near Lisbon, North Dakota, on November 4, 1888. He lived in Brookings since 1934. Whenever possible he attended the church services at the Baptist Community church.

He leaves behind one sister, Florence E. Mackey of Spokane, Washington. One uncle, M. W. Rose, of Brookings. One aunt, Aggie Trask of International Falls, Minn. Two nieces, Ruby Hill of Spokane, Washington and Irma Baker of Bonners Ferry, Idaho. One nephew, Marvin Mackey of Spokane, Wash.

His mother and one brother preceded him in death.

He died on February 28, 1948, at the age of 60 years, 4 months and 24 days.

"Wonderful co-operation has been given by the entire community," said Mrs. Lockland, an untiring worker on the project.
