

Curry County Raised \$1293.53 In Its March Of Dimes Campaign For 1948

Gold Beach—With the 1948 March of Dimes campaign closed, John C. Porisch, Curry county campaign director deposited \$646.77 to the credit of the Curry county chapter, Infantile Paralysis Fund. An equal amount was forwarded to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The local chapter funds are maintained to provide aid to infantile paralysis victims within Curry county. The National Foundation funds are used for research and education, and also to provide aid in epidemic areas where local chapter funds are exhausted.

The Curry county chapter fund was increased from \$1601.09 to \$2247.86 in this tenth annual March of Dimes campaign. Curry county is now able to defray the cost of one average case of polio without calling for financial assistance from the National Foundation.

County expenses included only cost of March of Dimes cards, posters, school cards, containers, and express charges.

Following are some of the noteworthy contributions which drew special commendation from the county campaign director.

The Gold Beach chamber of commerce for sponsoring a big dance which netted \$224.00.

The small Agnes community, which came through with a \$50 total contribution.

Marion Bowers of Gold Beach and his tavern assistants who drummed up a business of over \$50 for their March of Dimes containers. (Marion's little girls even put the contents of their piggy banks in Daddy's March of Dimes container after seeing Margaret O'Brien in the March of Dimes movie.)

Bert DeMoss of the Texaco station, Brookings for boosting the returns in their March of Dimes container to over \$30.

The grade schools of Curry county, which large or small, all contributed generously.

As shown by the above statement, central Curry county is this year's leading contributor to the March of Dimes. Brookings-Harbor was the leading contributor in the 1947 campaign. Both northern and central Curry county made record contributions to the cause this year.

The campaign in 1948 was conducted entirely on a voluntary basis without special solicitation.
