Curry County Fair Dates Set, Sept. 3-4

September 3 and 4 was set as the date for the Curry county Fair at a dinner meeting held in Brookings last week. This meeting was sponsored by the Brookings Chamber of Commerce and was attended by over sixty visitors from the Chetco area, and by the Fair Board, who were guests of the chamber of commerce.

Leo Lucas, president of the Fair Board, explained that this is a part of a promotional program to develop interest in the Curry county fair. He advised that meetings would be held in each community in the county upon invitation of local organizations.

Nat Perkins, Port Orford, who has served Curry county well for many years as showman at the state fair and the Pacific International, announced that he would contribute \$40.00 to pay for two 4-H club summer scholarships to be awarded to 4-H club girls participating in the dollar dinner contest at the local fair and also at the state fair.

R. M. Knox, county agent, gave a history of the development of the Curry county fair and also advised that the wonderful fair building and grounds recently developed had been financed without expense to tax payers in the

county.

Stanley Colegrove and Docia Sweet, both regular members of the fair board, urged general participation in the livestock show and 4-H club work. Dorothy Lockland, Brookings, spoke for the Azalea Garden club offering to put on the floral exhibit in accordance with a custom established as a result of two years successful participation of organized garden clubs of the county. Last year the Sixes Garden club took the responsibility of arranging the display.

General discussion and suggestions from the crowd follow: Joe Bush recommended free admission, Henry Horst announced that he was spokesman for all veterans organizations fighting for their interests, and many suggestions for revision of the premium lists were made. All other suggestions for improvements should be submitted in writing to the secretary of the fair board, Mrs. Georgia Fromm of Gold Beach.

Co Agent's Notes

PESTS IN YOUR PANTRY

If you have pests in your pantry, here's your opportunity to save money by saving grain products—stored in the pantry—from destruction by insects. Every year, large quantities of grain are destroyed by insects that attack food products.

Every home in the United States can contribute toward saving the peace of the world by destroying the "saboteurs of the pantry". If each family in the United States threw away only 50 cents' worth of cereal food, alone, because it had become infested with insects, the loss would amount to about \$15,000,000—a sum that would buy a vast amount of grain. Actually, losses taking place in the nation's kitchen cupboards and pantries because of insects probably exceed \$15,000,000.

You may think the amount of food you save insignificant. Add your savings to the savings resulting from the united effort of your fellow citizens and the total would help many starving people abroad through a crisis.

Clean your pantry shelves—Some food is bound to get spilled on shelves. Particles sift out of packages and remain on the shelf or lodge in cracks and corners. Insects can live on these food cupboards have been sprayed.

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particles. Also they get into food you might later place on the shelf. Clean the shelves of your cupboard and remove sources of infestation.

Spray with DDT. While you're cleaning the shelves and have all packages of food out, spray a 5 percent DDT solution on the interior surfaces of the cupboard. After the liquid has dried, a deposit of DDT crystals remain that will be effective for several months. Any insects that insist upon crawling around after the will be killed before they have a chance to lay eggs and start a

new infestation.

Insects that feed on products may also be found in such foods as spices, nut chocolate, cocoa, dehydrated dried foods, dry houp mixes, biscuit and bird seed.

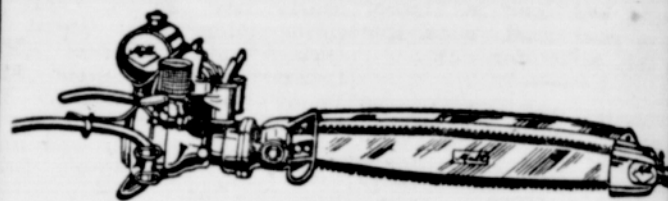
Too Late To Class
