## School Board Will Suggest Bond Issue

Howard James, member of the

school board, told the Rotary club, Tuesday, that he, as a member would ask that the school board go on record as favoring this movement at the March meeting, held Tuesday evening. He was assisted in explaining the district's predicament, by Lynn Hampton, club secretary, and superintendent of schools, locally.

"Time, you gentlemen must remember, is running out on this proposition. The department of education gives us until this coming June to show progress toward expansion, and until Sept., 1949, for completion. It is past the time of talking and 'lip service', action alone will count, now.

"The crowded school—just let me give you an idea—is no myth; 30-odd lockers serve over 100; the library room, sufficient for one table and a few chair is being used for a class room, with something like 25 chairs and four tables. That, gentlemen, is the actual status of the conditions we face. The state report contains six typewritten pages of such data.

"To bring this matter to a cli-

max, I am, tonight going to the school board to go on record favoring bonding the district the amount necessary to become "standard" in the eyes of the state department of education, that our graduates will have same chance with graduates other schools".

Lynn Hampton read the letter to the club, explaining what suggestion meant. We must tell the club, add another teacher to the staff this year to meet minimum requirements. In almost the same sentence, he said the state inspector told us we couldn't add anything more unless provisions are made for addition.

The present facilities, he pointed out, were built when the school population numbered the 30s. The present population of the 4-year high school is 100. The same ratio of increases holds true in the grade school side.

A state building expert will be here later this month to study the existing problem and make suggestions of the necessary building to house the school.
