Mrs. Blance Hamman of Portland is making an extended visit with Mr. and Mrs. Tony Olsen.

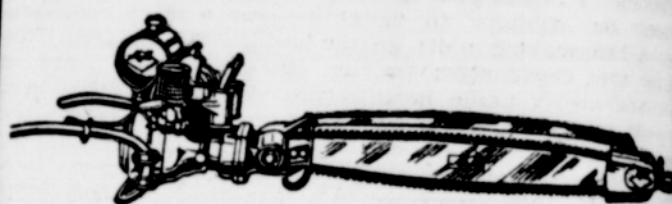
