

Ralph Vincent To Boost Brookings

Portland, (Special) — Ralph Vincent, of Brookings, Ore. has been appointed Curry county area chairman for the third annual campaign of the Oregon Advertising club's intra-state tourist promotion, which is set to reach its peak during the week of April 11 to 17.

Fred M. Kimball, state tourist committee chairman, announced the appointment. He explained that the Oregon state highway commission's travel information department, theatres, chambers of commerce, newspapers, radio stations and merchants have agreed to again put all effort in back of this movement.

"This campaign," explained Kimball, "is designed to teach Oregonians the value of being good hosts to our tourist guests. We are on a rising tide of tourist business and should be selfish-

wisely selfish-in doing our utmost to retain it. When we started out our campaign in 1946 our travel trade amounted to 85 million dollars which was a good increase over the pre-war year of 1941 when we did but a 50 million dollar tourist business. 1947 business was estimated at over 105 million dollars which is a substantial increase. This year we hope to step that up to 125 million dollars and handle the business so we will make the visitor want to come back again and again."

Coos-Curry Historical Assn. Meets at Coquille

Tony Felipe made the most points with 209 registered; Doyle Rausch with 135 and Raymond Reekman with 134 were his only real competitors in scoring.

Felipe's point-total was made up partly by the 90 field goals, and the same two competitors scored: Reekman 61 and Rausch 57.

In the free-throws again Felipe lead with 29, Rausch 21 and Groesbeck 15.

While the Bruins had many fouls charged against them Groesbeck lead with 61, followed by Vaughan 53 Reiling and Bob Church with 49.

Since it is easier and cheaper to make changes in the house before it is built, special forms have been prepared to assist in selecting the house plan best suited to the family, and to determine any needed changes in the plan. Working drawing, at a nominal charge may be had for any floor plan selected. Drop into the county extension office and discuss your house plans. Ask about the "cut-outs" which help determine the size and shape of rooms needed for your family.
