eling from end to end it would  
be extremely hard to say what  
impressed you most, the rugged  
rock strewn coast line or the  
sandy beaches, or maybe it was  
the wild array of wild flowers, or  
the high cliffs or the sheltered  
coves or possibly the animals or  
the birds or the beautiful rivers,

One of the finest gifts that  
the state has given its own peo-  
ple, as well as visitors from ev-

gon state highway commission,  
dozens of places in every part  
of the state are maintained as  
State parks.

Azalea State park is the first  
of the colorful preserves you

cated at the southerly outskirts  
of Brookings, contains the finest  
growth of native azaleas in the  
United States, if not in the en-  
tire world.

In sunshine and fog, through  
all extremes of weather these  
sturdy shrubs have survived for  
generations in this area. Several  
of the bushes are said to be over  
400 years old and the growth is  
profuse under these ideal condi-  
tions. Nature has surpassed the  
skill of the most experienced  
horticulturist. Blooms range all  
the way from white through pink  
to rose and even yellow in hue.  
And strangely but true, they  
bloom every month in the entire  
year, although they are at their  
best in mid-May and early June.

Here you can see just what  
makes the Oregon coast such a  
tourist attraction.

Being situated about 200 feet  
above the water, the beating of  
the surf against the rocks and  
the beach below is thrilling mus-  
ic to your ears, music that will  
play an accompaniment for you  
as you travel up the beautiful  
coast.

Abundant rainfall, plus the  
warming influence of the Japan-  
ese current, produces excellent  
growing conditions for forest  
and shrubbery and makes pos-  
sible a long flowering season.

bor school at \$100.00 per month);  
the state has prohibited further  
use of this hall-room saying it  
is too small in size, poorly lighted  
and ventilated and has no toilet  
or drinking facilities. This may  
necessitate using a double shift  
and splitting or dividing the  
school day into two separate  
sessions, four hours in the morn-  
ing for one class and four hours  
in the afternoon for another  
class. Children in the first four  
grades would thus go only half  
a day to school.

In conclusion, the state board  
of education declares that the  
present old building which houses  
part of the grade school and all  
of the high school should be con-  
verted entirely to a grade school  
and a new high school building  
constructed on a separate loca-  
tion. Considerable renovating and  
remodeling will have to be done  
on the old building to make it  
conform to state standards. "On  
the basis of the foregoing re-  
port," says the state board, "the  
Brookings-Harbor school is de-  
clared non-standard for the  
school year 1947-48. Since your  
school does not meet the require-  
ments for full standardization,  
it is necessary that a plan of ac-

tion be submitted. The plan  
should be specific, stating what  
can be done and when it is to be  
done." The report is signed by  
Rex Putnam, Superintendent, of  
Public Instruction.
