## Rogue River Topic Of April 9, Meet

**GOLD BEACH**—The Rogue River conservation committee, organized here some months ago, met last week to make plans for a general meeting of the Rogue River basin conservation committee, to be held in Gold Beach on April 9, when representatives from all parts of the Rogue River basin interested in the preservation of the Rogue river as a sport fishing and recreational area, as opposed to the proposed construction of dams in the river, will be present.

People interested in the Rogue river as a sport fishing and recreational area are convinced that the plans of the army engineers and the reclamation service to build a number of dams in the bed of the Rogue for diversion of the water for irrigation and the generation of electricity, will practically ruin it for recreational purposes, especially if the work is done along the lines proposed by the government engineers.

It is known that the Rogue river sports fishery alone brings in over \$100,000 annually to the state of Oregon, with a capitalized value at 4 percent of \$3,875,000. In addition over \$2,600,000 has been invested in resorts and other property pertaining to sport fishing and other recreational activities, the value of which would be practically destroyed if the recreational potential of the Rogue is lost.
