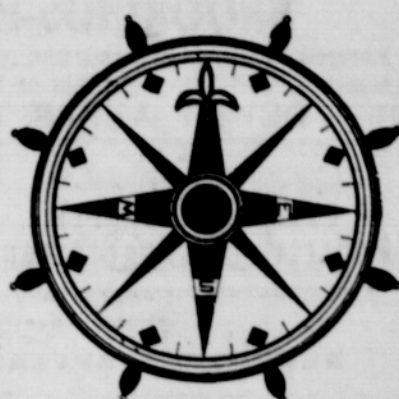

Fast rites for Mary Lou Stoller, accidental victim, were held at 2 p.m., Saturday from the Baptist Community church with Rev. J. W. Wiggins in charge, assisted by a Medford elder. The service was at the Brookings cemetery.

Daughter and youngest child, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Stoller, Mary Lou was born in the Harbor vicinity February 7, 1932. She attended the local schools and was a member of the sophomore class. Her popularity was attested by the massive floral arrangements given by various classes, classmates and the school children individually.

All bearers were members of the high school: Gene Reiling, Walter Garvin, Bob Church, Mrs. Brown, Raymond Reekman, LaVerne Mendenhall. From Truck. Last Wednesday noon she, and a group of boys and girls, were riding on the small truck driven by "Monk" Wilson, on the Harbor. Mrs. Kerns, nurse, soon after the scene ordered an ambulance and she was rushed to the hospital at Crescent City, where she was pronounced dead on arrival.

OFFSET PRESS IS INSTALLED AT PILOT PRINT SHOP

Another Step Is Made To Meet Demands of Growing Community

A Multilith Model 1250 offset press, capable of doing color printing or reproduction of photographs, has been installed by Brookings-Harbor Pilot to meet the demands of this growing community and clientele.

The latest word in presses of this type, this machine is best used for stationery which is distinctive through art work or photographs. Samples of this type of work may be seen on the "Pacific Coast View Stationery" which has been printed and placed in stores for sale.

Another feature of this press is the amount of production possible, which cannot be obtained on presses of other types.

The public is invited to inspect the work produced on this press, and see what possibilities the addition of this new machine may mean to the future of the community in way of advertising bulletins and circulars.

One of the first pieces of work to be done on this press will be the chamber of commerce booklets, many of which George Funk wishes to take to the Oakland flower show.

The recent tragedy that struck my family brought us more pain and sorrow than we have ever known. At the same time it brought us a demonstration of loyal friendship and human kindness that has given us blessed strength to carry on.

These neighbors and friends who came to see us to share our grief and to offer assistance are the people I would serve if I continued my political campaign as county commissioner.

I am withdrawing my name, as I do not feel now that I can give this splendid community the time and service they rightly deserve. I value the friendship of each and every one of them more than position or publicity.

From the depths of our hearts comes our appreciation and thanks to all who showed their thoughtfulness in so many different ways.—Louie Stoller.

TROUT PLANTED ON WINCHUCK AND CHETCO

Fish of Migrating Size; Hope For Better Fishing

At the request of Merle Hanscam, president of the Chetco Rod and Gun club, the Oregon State game commission released 10,000 trout in the Chetco and Winchuck rivers the past week.

These fish are of migrating size. That is they have been reared by the state hatcheries to a size which they ordinarily attain before making their seaward migration. This fact is important in that anadromous fish go to sea at certain sizes depending on the species of fish and the mortality rate is much higher with younger trout.

Since trout fishing has been on the downward grade in coastal waters during the past few years the state game commission has put into effect a big program of trout restocking. Coastal trout are among the most difficult of all fish to propagate artificially but with the energetic program now in operation, much is being learned about their life cycle, habits, diseases, etc.

Merle Hanscam showed the hatchery truck driver where the most accessible places were on the rivers and so the 5,000 trout earmarked for the Chetco were released near Bruce hole. In the Winchuck a like number were placed near Henry's ranch.

These finny beauties should afford fine sport for those anglers who love trout fishing and with the advent of spring and the opening of the trout season, what angler can truthfully say that his pulse does not beat just a little faster.
