

Cancer Research Is Being Expanded

Expansion of the present research program in cancer control and cure is one of the main objectives of the American Cancer Society which will stage its annual campaign for funds during the month of April.

The Curry county campaign will be headed by Jack Kronenberg of Bandon. Other county officers include Dr. R. M. McKeown who is county medical director. Kronenberg has been active in Curry county affairs for some time.

The campaign has the endorsement of Governor John Hall who pointed out that 1800 persons died of cancer in Oregon last

year.

"But great strides are being made in research on methods of control and cure," the governor stated. "These are largely supported through contributions to the American Cancer Society. Of your contribution, 60 percent remains in the state for programs of service, education and research."

The society hopes to exceed the more than \$130,000 raised in Oregon a year ago, according to E. B. McNaughton of Portland, state chairman.

COUNTY AGENT

FIRST DAIRY PRODUCTION TEST COMPLETED

The February report for the Coos-Curry Dairy Herd Improvement association has just been filed in the County Agent's office by Mr. Donaldson, supervising tester for the association. Three testers are working full time taking monthly samples on 4,760 individual cows. Annual butter fat production records will be computed and used as a basis for culling low production cows.

Only 8 Curry county dairymen are included in the test although nearly all located in north Curry indicated a desire for having the testing done. Coos county has 148 herds on test. The Curry county herds include: Hoyt Thompson, Star ranch, S. K. Seeber, Paul Wagner, Cloverdale farm, N. B. March, Chas. Caughell, Buffington & Zenker.

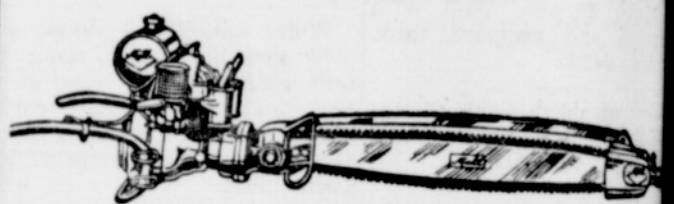
