Vet. Farm-Home Loan Data Available Now

An attractive 12-page pamphlet explaining the Oregon veterans' farm and home loan program has been released by the state department of veterans' affairs and is ready for distribution, Director William F. Gaarenstroom announced this week.

The pamphlet is available, free to veterans, county and veteran organization service officers, real estate agencies and others interested in the state's \$6,000 loan for eligible Oregon veterans of World War II. Booklets are available at the Department of Veterans' Affairs, State Library Building, Salem, or 416 S. W. 11 Avenue, Portland.

Along with a clear explanation of the procedure for applying for the loan, the pamphlet contains 41 pertinent questions most frequently asked regarding the state loan act, and the answers.

Reproduced on the back cover of the booklet is a "Veterans' Time Table," which gives in illustrated form the most important expiration dates of veterans' GI benefits.

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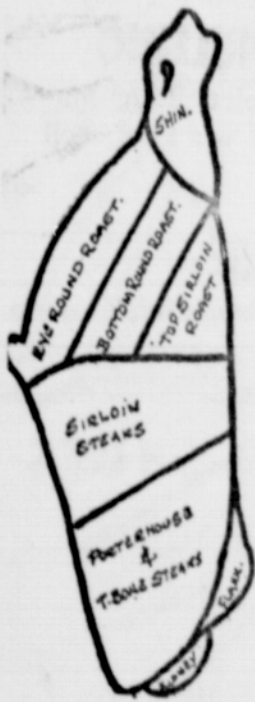

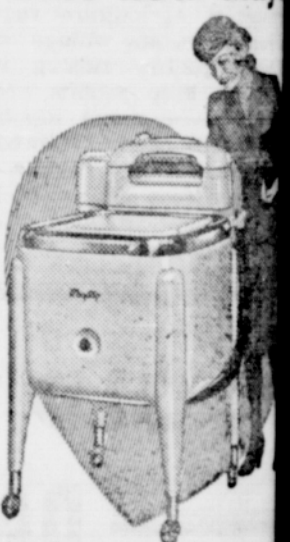
