eral years. Later she was elected to the office of vice-President of the department of Oregon, and the next year, 1946, was elected President of the department of Oregon. She was appointed in 1947 to the office of National Committeewoman by the National President of the American Legion Auxiliary. Her activities took her all over the United States.

Dorothy Templar was also active in Eastern Star circles. In 1934 she was initiated into Aloha chapter, No. 61, Order of the Eastern Star, KF, Oregon. After holding several offices, both elective and appointive, she became Worthy Matron in 1940. Her husband, Earl, was elected Worthy Patron in 1944, four years later.

In 1945 they moved from Klamath Falls to Brookings, Oregon, where they opened the Templar Hotel. Eight months ago Mrs. Templar, with the assistance of members in Brookings, instituted the Eastern Star chapter in Brookings, with the State Charter soon to be awarded. Dorothy and Earl Templar were elected as the chapter's first Worthy Matron and Worthy Patron, and Dorothy was Worthy Matron at the time of her passing.

In addition to the honors in the American Legion Auxiliary and the order of the Eastern Star she was very active in the affairs of the Methodist church, Parent-Teacher Association, the Camp Fire girls, Job's Daughters

and other philanthropic affairs. Dorothy had the natural ability of social leadership, both local and national. There were three generations of Masonic activity: Her mother, Mrs. Cora A. Sanderson, was Worthy Matron of Aloha chapter No. 61 in 1909; her daughter, Dorothy Sanderson Templar, was Worthy Matron of Aloha chapter, in 1940 and in 1944 her daughter, Margaret Templar Hesley, was Worthy Matron of Cascade Crest chapter. Mrs. Templar's father, Frederick T. Sanderson was Master of Masonic lodge, Canyonville, Oregon, in 1896. Ernel Hesley was Worthy Patron of OES with his wife and were installed by Mrs. Templar in 1944; and Master of Chiloquin lodge in 1943.

Survivors are the husband, Earl J. Templar; daughters, Margaret Hesley and Dorothy Diment; and grandchildren, Richard Templar Hesley, Fredrick Templar Hesley, Sandra Templar Diment, and Archie Gene Diment, her mother, Cora Ann Sanderson, of Prairie City; sister, Maysel Ellen Richards, Prairie City; brother, L. F. Sanderson, Berkely, California.

"Wendy Weeder" Writes:

Dear "Patsy Planter":

Wouldn't this be an odd and uncomfortable world in which to live if we were all forced to wade ankle deep in water all of the time. Never able to dry our toes. We would probably be a very unhealthy, as well as unhappy lot of people. But Patsy, did you ever stop to think that flowers and vegetables must certainly feel much the same as we do about having feet that are constantly wet? In fact, few, if any, flowers or vegetables will grow as they should with such wet feet. When water stands anywhere in the top two feet of the garden the soil becomes cold soggy and so poorly aerated that the beneficial bacteria activity ceases and plants are likely to rot and die. For this reason, I say: "Proper drainage, makes your garden." If you think your garden drainage problems are already taken care of, use this simple test before you discard all thoughts of drain outlets, etc. If water stands on the surface of the ground for more than two hours after a heavy rainfall, it indicates that additional drainage is required.

The most successful yet inexpensive method of providing a good garden drainage is the side ditch run-off. The depth of the ditch may vary with the conditions present, and it should drain into a sewer, creek or even a deeply dug hole filled with stone. All drains must lead to an outlet and should have a fall of three inches to each 100 feet.

In some gardens here the problem of drainage is not so great, a solution may be found by merely breaking up the subsoil so that the water will drain away through it.

I have found that for successful gardening there are three points which we should bear in mind. First, even if your gardening is done indoors, the choice of location is important. The sunshine a plant receives may govern its growth and beauty entirely. Second, is the selection of seed or plant stock, and Third, is proper care. As the poet Carolyn Giltan wrote:

"What makes a garden
And why do gardens grow?
Love lives in gardens."

The love you put into your garden will be returned to you in beauty and the joy of accomplishment and creation.

I have been working and experimenting this past week with all sorts of flowers and even with ordinary weeds. I hope to enter a flower arrangement in the Azalea Garden club's Flower show. Why don't you try it too. Patsy, do you think a blue ribbon could be mine?

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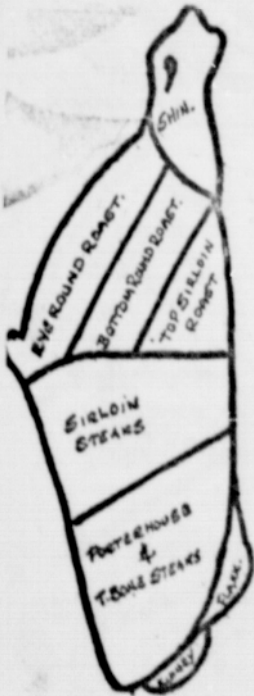
