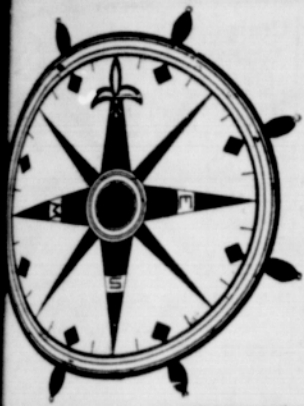
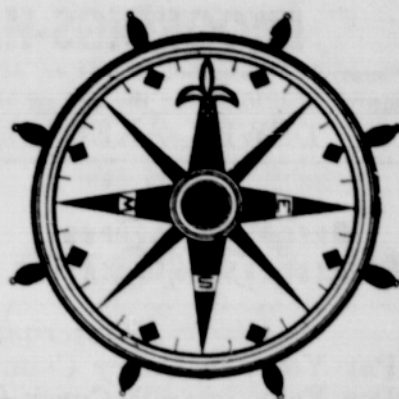

SERVICES HELD YESTERDAY FOR V. MUCHMORE

Suffered Stroke Wed.
and Never Rallied
Afterwards

Funeral services for Albert V. Muchmore were held at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the Baptist Community church. Rev. N. N. Neufeld officiated. Masonic rites were observed at the Croft lodge, A. F. & M., and cremation followed at the family home.

Mr. Muchmore suffered a paralytic stroke last Wednesday afternoon and never rallied. Death came shortly after 3 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 13, 1871, in Hamilton, Ohio, he went to Oklahoma as a young man, where he was an active part in Masonic work. He held all the degrees of Masonry, except the thirty-second, and had been a member of the order for half a century.

On October, India Temple of the Arab Order of Mystics sent him a new fez cap in remembrance that he had been a shiner 43 years. He also held a life membership in Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, and of Enid, Okla.

Early in the 1900s he came to Brookings and later engaged in the business at Medford for several years. He was a charter member and past president of the Order of American Revolution. In his family he came to the Brookings area three years ago. Surviving are: His widow, Anna, a daughter, Mrs. Mildred, two granddaughters, Joan and Margaret, and five sisters in the midwest.

ATTENTION CITIZENS Of Brookings and Harbor

Through the concerted action of the chamber of commerce and a large group of local people the lot adjoining Williamson's bakery has been purchased at a cost of \$1000. It has been deeded free of encumbrance, to the Brookings-Harbor Fire Protection District, and now stands recorded in their name.

It is the intention of all persons interested in this project to erect immediately a building to house the fire truck and the ambulance. It is unnecessary to point out the way in which both of those pieces of equipment are deteriorating due to being out in the weather.

It is also unnecessary after the tragic and all too frequent need of the ambulance these last weeks to point out how vital it is that both these pieces of equipment be properly housed and maintained.

We believe that just as the lot has already been paid for, the building can be erected in large measure, by donations of material and labor.

The lot is already being graded, as you may notice when you go to the Post office. The concrete slab will be poured within a matter of days. The committees responsible for obtaining the material are already at work and we are assured it will be laid down by the time it is needed. We expect to start work on the building sometime during the week of May 10th, if weather permits, on that date, and will finish the exterior of the building within a week.

We believe everyone will be in complete accord with this and show it by their full co-operation. The purpose of this notice is to ask that EACH and EVERY ONE OF US come in and signify just how much time during that week we will give. If everyone gives at least one full day of work, or if unable physically or for any other reason, the money to purchase one days labor nothing can stop us.

POPULAR MAN LAID TO REST AT SMITH RIVER

Death Came Suddenly Early Saturday At Beach Home

With services in charge of Roeder Funeral home, last respects were paid to Ralph Moore, Monday afternoon at Baptist Community church with Rev. Butler of the Federated Church, of Crescent City, officiating. Burial was at the family plot at Smith River.

Ralph Milton Moore was born Sept. 7, 1900, on the place now owned by E. L. Miller, up the Chetco. He attended his first two years of high school here, completing at Ashland.

For more than a year he drove the school bus in the Harbor area and had a warm following among the youngsters, who turned out in numbers at the church. Recently he had been doing farm work whenever weather permitted. Saturday, due to the rain, he went to the beach near his home, where a fatal heart attack claimed him about 10 o'clock.

Surviving are: His mother, Mrs. Bertha Moore; sister, Mrs. E. L. Cassel of Fort Dick; three nieces, Berta Moratto, Patricia Dodge, both of Santa Rosa, Calif. and Betty Swanson of Crescent City, in addition to several distant relatives in this area.

Fire Damaged Sawmill, Sat.

Following the dry bark and sawdust from the burner to the mill, fire reached the head-rig of Brookings Lumber Co., Saturday afternoon, and before it was brought under control, did an estimated \$6000 damage.

According to Henry Kerr, all the men were gone at the time and had it not been for women living near the mill, complete destruction might have resulted.

Together with children, the ladies formed a bucket brigade from the pond and by time the Brookings fire department reached the scene, had successfully controlled the blaze.

While it was necessary to go for a second truck of water, the fire department had little difficulty in extinguishing the blaze.

This mill, the only one which was able to saw with regularity during the recent rains, now may be shut down for some time when repairing must be done.

Popular Resident Was Victim of Spinal Meningitis, Wed.

Graveside services for Margaretha Aune Tisdale were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at Brookings Cemetery, with Rev. N. N. Neufeld, pastor of the Baptist Community church officiating. Mrs. Tisdale passed away last Wednesday afternoon after being stricken Sunday with spinal meningitis.

Popular in this community, where she had served for a time as member of the school board, and where she had taken part in many civic affairs, she had endeared herself to everyone.

Margaret Aune Tisdale was born in Portland, Oregon, April 11, 1898. Daughter of Jonas Struck Aune and Petra Aune, pioneer Portland photographer.

She graduated from Washington high school, when she and her brother Rinar learned photography in their father's studios in Portland, Los Angeles and Pendleton. Her professional specialty was in portraits of children which she exquisitely colored in oils.

Studying voice with Samoiloff, a famous Russian coach, it was her pleasure and privilege to be accompanied by Andre Kostelanetz.

She became possessed of a beautiful voice and gave others pleasure by singing whenever she was asked.

While in Portland, Mrs. Tisdale was a member of the Business and Professional women and of the Delphian society.

In Brookings Mrs. Tisdale was an ardent member of the Azalea Garden club, the chamber of commerce and a one time member of the school board.

She leaves her husband, Luther Leib Tisdale, a sister, Mrs. Ivan Houser, of Milwaukie, Oregon, a brother, Rinar Aune, of Portland.
