

New Plates Will Save State Funds

Earl T. Newbry, candidate for the republican nomination for secretary of state, has developed plans for permanent license plates and changes in the distribution of license plates that will save Oregon taxpayers several hundred thousand dollars per year and provide more convenient service to motorists during the five months that he has been in office. Newbry was appointed secretary of state after the accidental death of Robert S. Farrell, Jr., last fall.

Newbry first served the state as a representative in the 1939 and 1941 sessions of the legis-

lature, and as a senator in the 1942 and 1946 sessions. As a legislator he was a strong champion of highway and agricultural legislation. In 1947 he was chairman of the senate labor and industries committee.

Not a professional politician, Newbry is a successful fruit grower and shipper and owns a 250 acre orchard in the Rogue river valley. Since he became secretary of state his son, Lyndell, 24-year old veteran, has managed the orchards.

Newbry has a daughter, Shirley, 16, a student at Salem high school. His wife, the former Ruth Johnston, is a native of Oregon and a graduate of Oregon state college. Newbry was born in Colorado and attended Washington State college. He is 48.

A civic leader, Newbry is a past president of the Ashland chamber of commerce and a director of the Jackson county chamber. He is also an active member of his American Legion Post of the Rotary club.

Among the foremost projects in his campaign platform is an auto license plan to save Oregon taxpayers money. The position he seeks is one of the utmost importance, and he is suited in his background and training to fill it capably.

Newbry, a Methodist, is at present District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler of the Elks for Oregon South. He is a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason, Past Master of Blue lodge, Commander of Knights Templar, Past Patron Eastern Star, a Shriner and present potentate of Hillah Temple.

"Wendy Weeder" Writes:

Dear "Patsy Planter":

P. B. Shelley gives us this poem. It seems to express the spirit of spring so very clearly:

"And the Spring arose on the garden fair,
Like the spirit of love felt everywhere;
And each flower and herb on earth's dark breast
Rose from the dreams of it's wintry rest."

Those are beautiful words, expressing the years most beautiful season.

This week I have some interesting ideas about roses, and Patsy, if you heed my suggestions your roses will be beautiful enough for a blue ribbon at the Azalea garden club's flower show.

First let us disregard a rule which applies to most plants in your garden, but which does not apply to roses. "Don't crowd the plants", is that rule. If you want successful roses, you should plant them close together so that the foliage will keep the ground cool and shaded, a condition roses enjoy.

When setting a rose bush in the spring, shorten the strong branch to 6 or 8 inches and cut the weaker branches even more drastically. Heap the soil as high as the branches are pruned, to protect against drying until the roots become established, and when the new shoots start, remove the bank of soil, leveling the surface. During the growing season, cut branches to one or two leaves when cutting flowers.

A thinning process is important to your clustered or climbing roses. Old hard canes which have carried blooms should be cut at the base of the plant and the new shoots should be trained on the trellises or frames and fastened there.

The Polyantha rose, a very hardy plant, needs very little pruning but thinning, when used should be done in early spring before they bloom.

Be sure to watch this paper for all details concerning the Azalea Garden club Flower show and don't fail to study the show schedule when it appears. It will surely be of great importance to you. I'll try to keep you posted, too. Till we meet next week—Love, "Wendy Weeder"
