"Wendy Weeder" Writes:

Dear "Patsy Planter":

There is no more perfect planting foundation than evergreens. Their purpose is to harmonize and soften the sharp contrast between the horizontal ground lines and the vertical house lines. The most graceful manner of placing these foundation plants is to accent the corners of the house with taller plants and also to use tall plants at either side of the entrances. Low growing evergreens should be planted between these taller ones.

Architectural vertical lines can be emphasized by columnar cedars or junipers; and the lower lines of the house may be emphasized by spreading forms of junipers and yews. It is best to avoid pines and spruces as they grow too tall and their low branches spread too far.

In order to make the soil suitable for evergreens, spade it thoroughly so as to loosen the sub-soil, make sure of proper drainage, add plenty of fertilizer and if needed, add coarse sand and peat.

As long as our discussion concerns evergreens, perhaps you'd be interested in some facts I've learned about hedges. In many cases hedges are to a garden, what walls and partitions are to a house, so Patsy, if you are planning a hedge, here are several factors you'll want to consider: First, which type of shrub will grow well in the soil you plan to plant you hedge? and, Second, will the shrub you select make a desirable, sturdy, dense growth?

As your hedge grows, pruning will become a problem to you. There is no short-cut to pruning a hedge, but I do have a hint that may interest you. In recent years a hedge shrub has been introduced which requires no pruning. It is the Barberry Mentor-ensis, often referred to as the Evergreen Barberry, and it appears to be a cross between the Thunbergi and the Julianae barberries. In contrast with common barberry, this shrub has strong upright branches and is therefore very suitable for hedges.

Now that we have a definite date (May 22) to look forward to for the Azalea Festival and Flower show, we can truly begin to make plans. I understand that the Azalea Garden club has asked the various organizations of our community to take part in the flower show by showing flower arrangements made up by the members of each group. Isn't that a grand way to create interest in the affair? Be sure to look elsewhere in this issue for further news of the flower show.
