Oregon Display Show Up Well In California

Verne H. Tinnerstet, manager of the Oregon Coast association, returned from California where he represented the Oregon Coast at the sportsmen's and vacation shows in Oakland and Los Angeles.

According to Tinnerstet, Oregon's exhibit was one of the most outstanding at both shows. The Oakland show ran from March 26 to April 4 and the Los Angeles show from April 8 to April 18, the overall attendance being

400,000. Other representatives of the state of Oregon were Carl Jordan, State Highway commission, Travel information dept; Wilfred Jobsey, central Oregon representative; and V. C. McVail, Portland chamber of commerce.

Oregon's exhibit covered a 30 ft. by 10 ft. space, one of the largest at the shows. Agates and Japanese glass floats were part of the coast display. Moving pictures were shown.

In addition to distributing literature and promoting vacation and tourist travel on the Oregon coast, Tinnerstet visited travel editors of travel magazines and newspapers, chambers of commerce, automobile associations and travel bureaus in San Francisco, Oakland and Los Angeles.

He reports that the California people were very appreciative of the Oregon exhibit and the aid given by the Oregon representatives to those seeking information on vacationing in Oregon.

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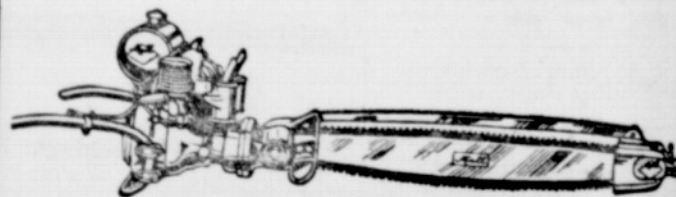
