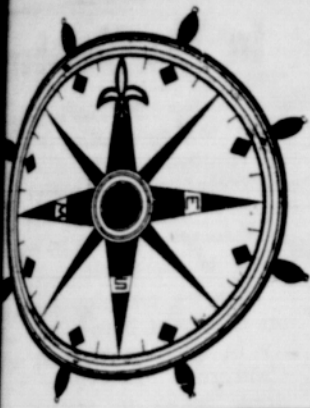
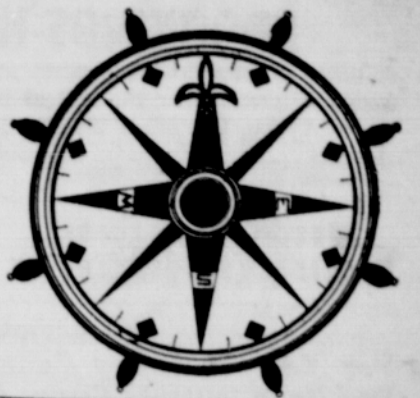

FIRST CURRY CO. CAMPOREE IS SET FOR COMING HOLIDAY

Boys Will Gather At Winchuck Camp Late Friday Evening

The first Curry county Boy camporee will be held in the area, beginning Friday evening, and will continue over the weekend at Westmore camp, up the Winchuck valley. 2:30 to 4:30—Scoutcraft contest.

6:00 to 6:00—Supper, clean up and inspection.

7:00 to 7:30—Patrols visit at patrol sites.

8:00 to 9:45—Court of recognition, songfest, and special entertainment.

10:00—taps.

Sunday: 6:30—reveille.

8:00 to 7:00—assembly, colors and inspection.

8:00 to 8:30—Breakfast, the clean-up and inspection of camp.

9:00 to 9:00—church.

9:00 to 9:30—final inspection of grounds and quarters. Pack up.

QUEEN BANQUET SERVED TO 123 SUNDAY EVENING

Manley Robinson Told Of Magnitude Of the Ore. Tourist Business

Climaxing one of this area's best festivals, from all standpoints, was the queen's banquet, held at 6:00 p. m. Sunday at the Grange hall. The meal was under direction and preparation of the Episcopal ladies.

Following the opening, with Bradley Page as toastmaster, all the guests were introduced, including the queen and her court and escorts.

Miss Betty Goldizen favored the group with two vocal selections, accompanied by Mrs. Stanley Patterson, to open the program. Following this Mrs. Chas. Seymour gave two flute solos, accompanied by Mrs. Patterson.

An instrumental trio, Mrs. Gilbert Christensen on the violin, Mrs. Seymour on the flute and Mrs. Patterson at the piano, gave three numbers, going back for the second encore. This same group, as a vocal trio, and accompanied by Mrs. L. A. Harvey, sang three numbers, with "End of a Perfect Day" as the second encore.

In reviewing the successes of the 1948 Azalea Festival, Mr. Page introduced members of the committees who worked diligently on the several phases of the project, including Mrs. Alice Perkins as flower show chairman, Mrs. Perkins introduced Mrs. Dorothy Lockland, president of Azalea Garden Club, which organization staged the event.

Manley Robinson, head of the Oregon travel bureau, which has done much in recent years to attract tourists to Oregon, spoke about the tourist business, and how it had become one of America's "big businesses."

"Our forefathers depended upon four main sources for their revenue: agriculture, timber, the fish canneries and mining. These are still main sources, although care must be exercised in each of them to prevent depletion.

"However, last year the tourist business in the United States aggregated almost 14 billion dollars."

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Gold Beach Band Is Popular Locally

Adding much to the festive occasion Sunday was the 30-odd piece Gold Beach band, resplendent in gold and black uniforms, which played at the park during the barbecue, and later at the high school field.
