livered the message, comparing
the site of worship to that gar-
den mentioned in Genesis, and
which saw the beginning of the
present civilization.

provide.
Immediately after the close of
church services, the annual bar-
becue was served by the associ-
ation committee, to some 1000
guests. Adding color to the ad-

more visitors than the day be-
fore. Allm Contractors, of Cres-
cent City, met the all-star soft-

bring the festival to its climax
—the queen's banquet.
