Brookings enthusiasts of the national pastime are anxious to see a baseball team organized in this community with the possibility of joining league play.

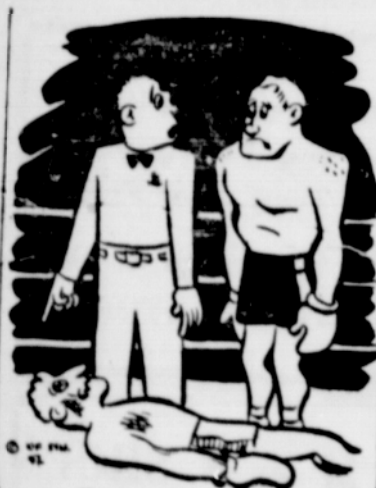
