Letter Describes Costa Rica Revolt

Continued from last week

However, in the afternoon there was a demonstration in San Jose. Some of the commun-

ists were objecting to turning over their arms and a group fled into the cathedral there seeking refuge. They were persuaded by a group who fired into the national theatre. For some time things were plenty warm. I understand. Then last night or rather late in the afternoon there was firing on a good many street corners and some communists still had their machine guns and were making good use of them before turning them in.

Don Pio, our chauffeur, you remember, was in jail of course, but is now released and is chief of police in Tres Rios. He was very free with his embraces for all of us yesterday when we went through there. I gave him your greetings and he in turn asked to be remembered to you.

Oh, yes, the "General" has accepted a position as director of the opposition cleaning-up force in Turrialba, a town between here and Limon. He seemed very happy marching off to his post of duty, but says he'll never forget all his friends up here, and he asked us to send him a Bible. He had borrowed mine and had read a great deal in it the last week or so before he left. He devised quite a plan for protecting his identity. Once when some strangers came up and he had to answer the door there at Lopez' apartment, he asked right off, "were you wanting to see brother Lopez?" He asked us all to call him "brother" and you should have seen the way he'd take part in the discussion of the Sabbath school lesson. If any stranger had happened by, I'm sure he would really have thought the General, one of us, though he never got over his habit of sitting behind the doors. Three different times the government announced his death or imprisonment, but he's as much alive as anyone I know.

The death toll for the government was really high. For several nights they would bring in great truck loads of the dead into San Jose for burial, but just before the trucks would enter the guards would start firing at all street corners to keep people off the streets until the burial could go forward. This got too hard on the morale of the people and then bodies were burned on the field of battle. Some oppositionists even testify that they saw living wounded raked up and thrown into the ditches to be burned with the dead. On Sunday of this week bodies of the war victims were found on the farm of the doctor here below us where they had died after fleeing from the battleground at El Alto last Tuesday. Some estimate conservatively that 2000 must have died to the side of the government. A later number indicated there were between 2500 and 3000.

I am very sure that our five weeks of actual fighting here must have been as nothing in comparison to the five years in Europe, but I for one have had more than enough of war. Many more nights such as these and I think I should have lost fifteen of the ten pounds I had so carefully gained.

Some time back while there were no troops within miles of the campus, I had occasion to go over to the boys' dormitory one evening. We had no lights at the time and I carried a flashlight little dreaming that I would be spotted. The girl who was with me and I had barely stepped onto the boys' porch when, bang went a bullet past us, apparently fired from the hedge there at Adrean's house. That was the beginning of our "fun" up here on the hill. That night we had lights flashed in my windows. When I went to one of the girls rooms to sleep with her, (several of the office girls from

San Jose were up that week-end and I had lots of company in the dormitory) there came the light again. Off and on all night at intervals I saw it slowly move across my well. But I didn't dare peek out. The next day I learned that practically every home on the campus had been molested in the same manner.
