

ORE. PRIMARY ELECTION GAVE M'KAY VOTE EDGE

Dewey Took Oregon From Stassen Column In Oregon Primaries

It was evident that Oregon voters thought more of Dewey's showing in the debate with Stassen at Portland recently and said so by giving him the edge in the Oregon primaries last Friday.

While the lead was not impressive, it did show that he was a presidential contender, come the Republican national convention in June.

Hall, rated by many polls over the state, was upset by the forces of Doug McKay, Salem automobile dealer, to give McKay a 5,000 majority. McKay will face Lew Wallace, Democratic candidate in the general election.

In the local vote, Chas Grayshel lost to Fred Adams, whose vote in Coos county was large, although Grayshel did carry the local precincts. The county vote was: Adams, 476; Grayshel, 327. Since he had no opponent in the primaries, and since there has been no candidate on the Democratic ticket, Harris Ellsworth, incumbent congressman, is assured election in November. Truman's Democratic vote in Curry County, according to unofficial figures, was 356.

Unopposed Forsyth polled 721 votes for county judge, and Sutton 705 for assessor. Oleta Walker's vote for county clerk was 726.

In the commissioner race, in

which Louie Stoller who withdrew, polling 221 votes, Art B. Crook, incumbent, lead 292 to 251 over Doug Cooley.

Born at Washington, D. C., Dr. Charles Hall Barnes was born at Washington, D. C., on February 28, 1867. He spent his childhood days in the vicinity of Washington.

He received his medical training in the Physicians and Surgeons University, Boston, Mass. After graduation he practiced in Boston a few years, before moving to Los Angeles where he practiced medicine 18 years.

Twenty-three years ago he and his family moved to Del Norte County and later to the Harbor area, at which place they

were living when he was stricken over a week ago.

He was a member of the Methodist church of Los Angeles, and was a regular attendant of the church at Smith River.

He died May 17 at Eugene, at the age of 81 years, 2 months and 20 days.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Miriam Iva; one daughter, Mrs. Miriam Norton, of Harbor and three sisters in New York state.

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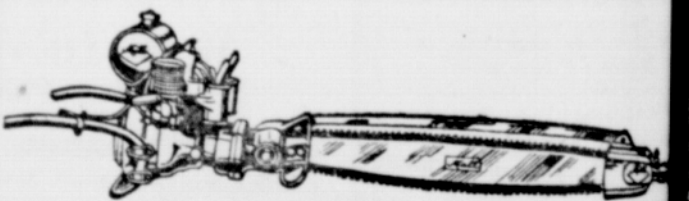
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
