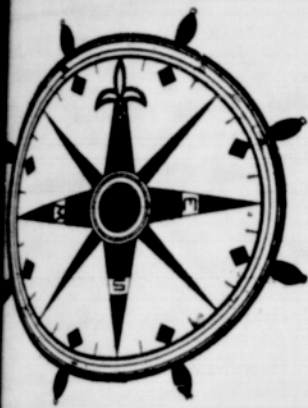
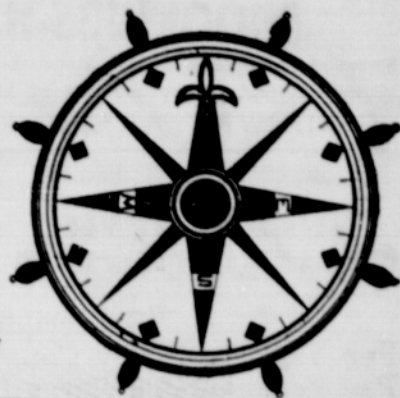

SCOUT TROOPS ENJOY FIRST CO. CAMPOREE, SAT.

Gold Beach, Port Or- ford and Brookings Troops Were Included

With over 50 Boys Scouts participating, the first Curry County camporee was held at Westmore forest service camp, eight miles up the Winchur river, over Memorial day week-end.

Brookings was represented by 24 scouts, Gold Beach by ten and Port Orford by 18. The camporee was in charge of Dave Putnam, regional director.

In reporting the camporee to Rotary, Tuesday noon, John Ginther, scout master, told of how the lads endured the rains of Friday night with practically no comment, yet with high spirits, which by morning had ebbed considerably until the sun Saturday had dried the clothing.

Brookings' patrols took top honors, just 2/10 of a point below blue ribbon award set for any camporee.

In first aid the Owl patrol took honors, when they were given at "patient" who had fallen from a cliff, had broken a leg, in addition to suffering several other injuries. The performance, according to Mr. Ginther, was creditable for any patrol on the same assignment.

Following a triangular compass course, Brookings took first as the Eagle patrol actually hit the exact spot, but disagreement among patrol members caused the patrol to move its final destination.

The Eagle Patrol, with a rating 2.5, led all six patrols in camp, closely followed by the Owl patrol with 2.0—which is a standard patrol in any troop.

For camp inspection, both the local patrols tied, which was true through most all scoutcraft activities until it came to special activity rating, where the Owls fell down in comparison with the Eagle patrol.

Mr. Thomas, of Port Orford, accompanied his boys to camp Saturday morning as it was a graduation exercise which prevented Friday's appearance.

Gold Beach boys came without adult leadership, while John Ginther and Brad Tillotson had charge of Brookings troop.

Funds Sought For Portland Disaster

Relief for the destitute in the flooded areas is solicited through the medium of containers being placed, Wednesday morning, in businesses houses of this area, and being cared for by the Auxiliary of the local VFW post.

The work was undertaken immediately following receipt by M. S. Brainard, of an urgent telegram from the VFW headquarters, in Portland, asking that all available post and auxiliary relief funds be forwarded immediately and to follow with as much more as could be obtained. A sizeable sum from the relief funds of both post and auxiliary has already been forwarded, much of it obtained through the recent sale of Buddy poppies.

The money will probably be used, primarily, to finance rehabilitation of the thousands of G. I. students attending Vanport GI college, and their families but, according to Brainard, as disbursement of the funds will be through experienced veteran hands, it is more than probable that every penny will be closely scrutinized before it is handed out.
