School District Bond Election Notice

State of Oregon, County of Curry, School District No. 17, ss.

Notice is hereby given that at a school district bond election called to be held at the school house, Brookings, Oregon, for school district No. 17, Curry County, Oregon, the day of June, A. D., 1948, between the hours of 2 o'clock p. m. and 7 o'clock p. m., there shall be submitted to the legal voters thereof the question of

issuing a bonded indebtedness in the sum of \$112,000.00 for the purpose of providing funds which to build and equip school buildings, and repair and improve the present buildings and grounds in and for said school district.

NOTICE of School Election Upon Question of Increasing Tax Levy Over Amount Limited By Section 11, Article XI, State Constitution.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in School District No. 17 of Curry County, State of Oregon, from 8 p. m. to 9 p. m. at the school house, June 22, 1948, in said school district, for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said district the question of increasing the tax levy for the fiscal year 1948-1949 over the amount limited by section 11, article XI, of the Constitution of Oregon.

The reason for increasing such levy are: To provide for more adequate facilities for the increased public school population and for increased cost of operation.

The amount of tax, in excess of the 6% limitation, proposed to be levied for said fiscal year is \$19,358.20.

HELLO, THERE:

The meeting started at 10:45 a. m. and the delegates worked hard until 4 p. m. It was hot in the court room and I can truthfully say we "sweat" over the program planning. The full delegation and the program planned will be found elsewhere in this issue. With this month's meeting we will adjourn the home extension unit meetings until next October. At that time we hope all of you will be with us and bring a friend with you.

The Gold Beach extension unit held its last meeting for the year at the home of their chairman, Alma Russell. After the business session and demonstration, Mrs. Russell served rolled sandwiches and spiced tea. After the first sip there was a demand for her recipe. So, I thought a few of you might like it too and asked permission to put the recipe in this column. Here is Mrs. Russell's spiced tea:

Take 2 teaspoons green tea and 1/4 teaspoon each of ground cinnamon, cloves and allspice. Tie in a bag and boil in one quart of water for 10 minutes. Add 3 cups of sugar and the juice from 4 oranges and 3 lemons. Add water to make 1 gallon of tea. This may be stored in the refrigerator and heated before serving. It should be served piping hot.

Have you heard about the easy way to clean an oven? Keep a bottle of household ammonia and a cleaning cloth near your range. They will come in handy when grease or food has been spilled in the oven. Leave it there overnight with the oven door closed. By morning the ammonia fumes will have loosened the burned food so it can be removed by

washing with a mild soap. For a long-standing burn, lay the cloth saturated with the household ammonia directly over the oven bottom. This will really work, folks—it cleaned my oven, easy.

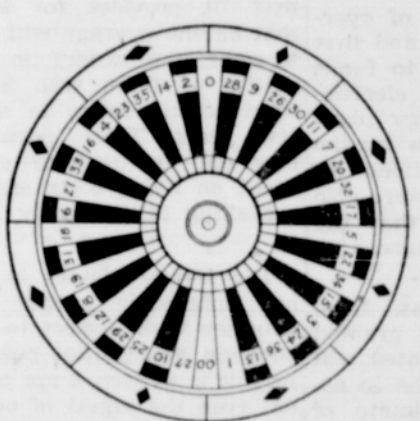

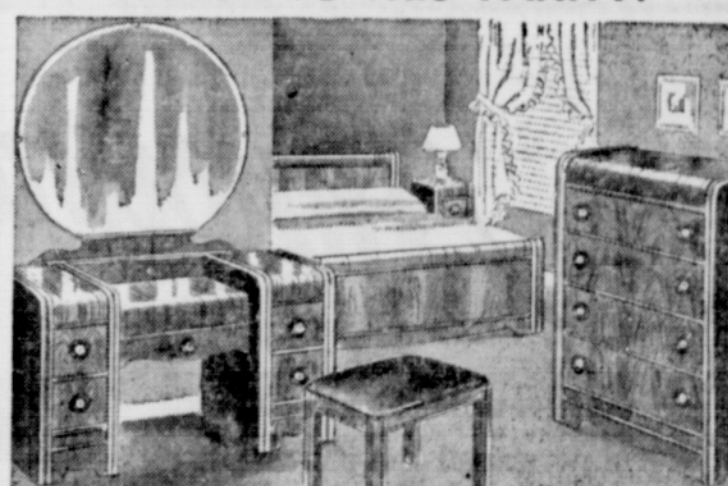
