UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 1—Class re-unions will feature the 71st annual commencement week-end, June 11, 12 and 13, at the University of Oregon, according to Lester E. Anderson, alumni director. June 12 has been designated as Alumni day, he said.

Opening the activities of the week-end will be the annual Pauline Potter Homer memorial tea in the library browsing room Friday afternoon. Saturday's events will start with the traditional breakfast of the state association of University of Oregon women, when women of the 50-year class of 1898 and this year's senior women will be the honored guests.

The semi-annual meeting of the Oregon alumni association is slated for Saturday morning with a luncheon following in John Straub hall.

Outstanding event of Saturday is the ground-breaking for the Erb memorial union. This ceremony will be held at 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The president's reception for alumni will follow and in the evening class re-union dinners have been planned at local hotels. Graduates of '98, '08, '13, '23 and '28 will meet for these events.

Saturday evening will conclude with the Failing-Beekman orations. Dr. Henry N. Weiman, visiting professor of religion at the university, will address the graduates Sunday morning for the baccalaureate service, which will be held at McArthur court.
