Memorial Services Held At Park, Sun.

An impressive service was held here last Sunday, on the community's observance of Memorial day.

Commencing with special services at the Community church, continuing on through services at the "grave" for the "Unknown Soldier" in the setting of Azalea State Park, and remembrance of the sea's dead, with services on the Chetco bridge, no one deeply and intimately concerned could have wished for more.

In his sermon, Rev. Nick N. Neufeld, himself a veteran chaplain, stressed the debt owed to all Americans to those men who had, by their varied sacrifices, made possible the continuing right of free assembly and free worship as we, of all nations, alone enjoy. He especially stressed our obligation to those who gave their lives that we might enjoy our special privileges.

A feature of the services in the church was that ex-chaplain Neufeld was himself in his service uniform, and was flanked, upon the platform, by the commanders of the local Legion and V. F. W. posts, Val Mendenhall Jr., and Roy Stephenson, both in their uniforms they wore in the army air force, and the U. S. submarine services, respectively. Both commanders participated in the services.

The veterans also provided a full armed color guard and firing squad, volleys being fired at both the park and bridge ceremonies. Beautiful flowers were provided by the ladies.

On the preceding day a delegation of veterans cleaned up

the veterans graves in the local cemetery and re-nued the flags upon them, a duty they obligate themselves to 'so long as one veteran survives.'

VFW Members To Stage Encampment

PORTLAND — One hundred and forty-six Veterans of Foreign Wars posts and 129 Auxiliaries throughout the state are preparing to send delegates to the 27th annual state encampment of VFW, this year scheduled for Pendleton, June 15 to 19.

Francis G. Bates, Bend, state commander of VFW, has informed Portland VFW headquarters that 1500 are expected to attend the encampment.

Art Nalls, Pendleton, state chairman of the encampment, has announced that Clyde Lewis, Plattsburg, N. Y., attorney, the junior vice-commander-in-chief of VFW, has been invited to attend the encampment as representative of national officers. He is originally of Aberdeen and is well acquainted throughout the Pacific northwest. He is the first world war 2 veteran to achieve high VFW office and, according to tradition, is in line to become

national commander-in-chief in 1950.

National auxiliary officer attending the Oregon encampment will be Consuelo Peart DeCoe, of Sacramento, past national president. Freeda Peterson, of The Dalles, state auxiliary president, will head the sessions.

County Aid Due Before July First

SALEM — Veterans' organizations seeking county aid to finance construction or purchase of club buildings have only until July 1 to file application, the Oregon department of Veteran Affairs pointed out Monday.

Chapter 595, Oregon laws 1947, authorizes county courts to give financial aid "upon the application of any two or more federally recognized veterans organizations" for the acquisition of meeting halls, and sets July 1 of this year as the deadline for applying.

The counties are limited to the following amounts which may be appropriated: In counties of from 1000 to 5000 population, \$5,000; to 10,000 population, \$10,000; to 20,000 population, \$15,000; to 100,000 population, \$25,000; over 100,000 population, \$50,000.00.

The law says such buildings "are to be used as a continuing expression of appreciation to those who are serving and those who have served (in the armed forces during any war), and as memorials to their comrades who did not return."

The application must "specify the amount of money requested, the location of the building, the funds otherwise available, the probable cost" and other information required by the county court.

The county court is authorized to allocate the funds to various communities in the county if requested, but not more than one memorial building in any one city may receive funds under this act.

Rogue Hearing Is Set

BOISE, Idaho, (special to the Pilot)—The presentation of testimony at the public hearing of the Bureau of Reclamation's alternative plans for the development of water resources of the Rogue river basin, to be held at Medford, June 8, will be divided into four parts, E. N. Torbett, regional planning officer, said at an interview early this week.

Victor Boehl, president of the Rogue Valley Irrigation association, Route 4, Box 665, Grants Pass, will lead the testimony on irrigation, Kenneth G. Denman, chairman, Rogue River Basin Conservation committee, Medford, the testimony on sports fishing, and Glenn L. Jackson, president of the Jackson County chamber of commerce, Medford, the testimony of general business interests.

The person heading the flood control discussion has not been made known to the bureau, Torbett said.

"It is desired that statements by representatives of organizations and by individuals be grouped, so far as possible in accordance with major interests involved," Torbett said. "Anyone wishing to present testimony should contact the individuals in charge of each group presentation. Neil Allen, Grants Pass, can be contacted by those interested in flood control."

Two pyrex bowls are home, brought home from Sea Scout crab feed. I like to find the owners were containers for potatoes. —Mrs. Minna Akers.

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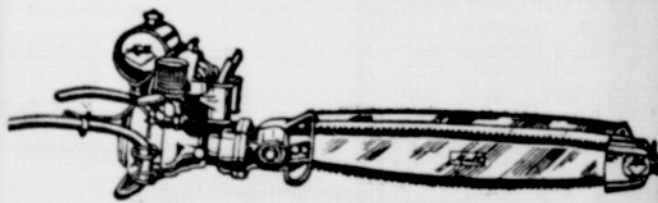
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
