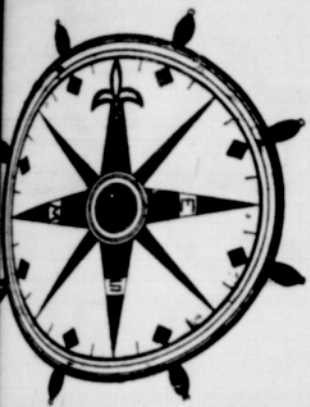
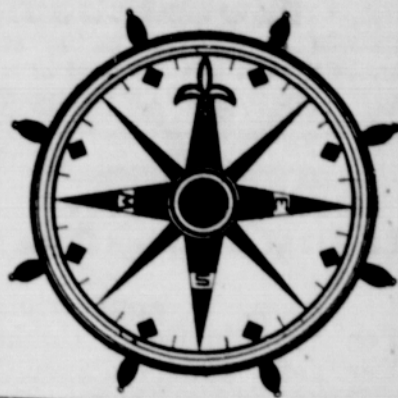

School District No 17 Will Voice Itself At Bond Issue Election Set For June 14

District No. 17 will be given the opportunity, Monday, June 14 from 2 to 7 p. m. to decide if it will bond and build, or pass up the state aid of some 20-odd thousand dollars, and maintain a sub-standard school. These were the blunt facts that were pointed out at Rotary club, Tuesday by those interested in advancing the local schools.

In June 1944, there were five teachers, and about one-third the

number of pupils enrolled as may be found registered today. Today the faculty has 14 teachers, and there not only is insufficient classroom space, but equipment is not available to care for any ways near the number enrolled.

Early this spring state department of education inspector declared the high school "conditionally standard," until June of this year, when it will lose that rating. The grade school, at a later date was declared non-standard, in a report some 15 pages long.

If passed, under the bonding plan bids for construction will be called as soon as legally possible.

A study of its contents will prove that there is little choice in the matter.

Pre-School Clinic Set, Wed., June 16

Beginning at 9:00 a. m., Wednesday, June 16, Dr. Erickson, M. D., and Dr. J. E. Stevenson, dentist, will conduct a free, pre-school clinic in their office. Only those children entering school next fall will be examined at this time.

The object of this examination now is to give parents opportunity and time to correct any irregularity of health during the summer months, and thus be assured their child will enter school next fall in the best of health.

General information concerning health habits will be requested: age of walking and talking, approximate gain in height and weight in last 12 months, approximate years any diseases were contracted, and date of all immunizations, vaccinations and tests (tuberculosis, etc.).

This clinic is under auspices of the Parent-Teachers Association and a committee composed of Mrs. A. P. Hendricks, pres., Mrs. Claude Goldizen, chairman, Mrs. Bert DeMoss, Mrs. A. F. Pierce, Mrs. Freeman and Mrs. Clifford Brimm, will assist the doctors.

Each parent of a child will be contacted and appointments will be made. Families new to this vicinity since the school census last fall, should contact one of the committee.
