SALEM—Business and civic leaders of the various cities and counties of Oregon are deeply concerned regarding the many campaigns for funds which are continually taking place in the various counties, according to the many comments appearing in the daily and weekly newspapers.

Curry county last year made some progress in consolidating the many campaigns for funds by raising funds for 10 state agencies at one time under the name of the Oregon Chest and during the same drive with the same amount of effort raised funds for certain local character building agencies.

This combining of campaigns in the Community chest is a forward step because it eliminates many solicitations thereby relieving the business men of our communities from being continually harassed by a large number of individual solicitors and from being pressed into service on a large number of campaigns. 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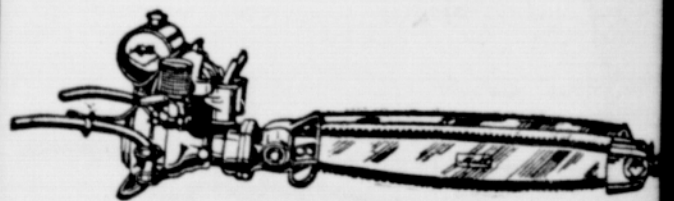
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
