

De-Bunk The Lumber Baron Yarn

Charles R. Ross, Oregon State extension forester, says there is no truth to the story. Speaking of the belief that timber and trees are "big business," Actual fact and figures prove that so-called "timber barons" are pretty hard to find. Ross points out that right in Oregon the number of persons who own wood land is close to 45,000. He says 63% of Oregon's privately owned forest reserves are owned by individuals with holdings less than 5000 acres apiece. Oregon farmers play an important role with their timber. As a matter of fact, in western Oregon there's an average of 10 acres of woods for each

from the national standpoint 10 million persons in the U. S. own a piece of wood land which is less than 5000 acres. Other, these small acreage owners control two million acres. That's 60% of all the privately owned forest land in the country.

Meanwhile, a change is taking place in the minds of the small property owner. Ross says prior to 1940, few farmers owned anything but pasture and wood supply in their woodlots. He felt it did not pay to try to grow small trees. And it took a long time to grow salable trees. But, there's been a big change in that thinking. Now, Ross says farmers are growing knowingly about pole, log, pulpwood and fuel markets. Ross says markets for the land products are bound to increase. Second growth timber is getting to be more valuable than stands of old growth forest are being cut. So, the day is not far away when farmers will receive an annual cash crop from their woods just as they do from their plowed land.
