Beaver Boys State Plans Completed

CORVALLIS—Preparations for the 12th Annual Beaver Boys State, sponsored by the American Legion, department of Oregon, on the campus of Oregon State College, June 26 to July 3, inclusive, are now nearing completion, according to Aubrey S. Tussing, Salem, president of the board of directors.

Approximately 60 Legion posts throughout Oregon have signified intention of sending boys to Boys State this year. Ten posts already have sent in enrollment cards accounting for 16 boys. These include: LaGrande, 5; Harrisburg, 2; Tualatin Valley, 2; Sherwood, 1; Waldport, 1; Parkrose, 1; Gold Beach, 1; Drain, 1; Dallas, 1; and 41st Division, at Portland, 1.

Enrollment is limited to 200 boys between ages of 15 and 17 who have completed their eighth grade and have not yet entered college. These boys are selected for their qualifications in leadership and good citizenship on recommendation of their high school principal or school superintendent. They will engage in eight days of actual practice of city, county, and state government, as set forth under the constitution.

Boys State originated in Illinois in 1934 and since has been adopted by 45 states. More than 2000 boys to date have attended sessions of Beaver Boys State.

Deadline for enrollment has been set by the directors as June 16. All applications from sponsoring posts must be in the hands of Tom Collins, department adjutant, and secretary of Boys State, 429 SW 4th Ave., Portland not later than that date.

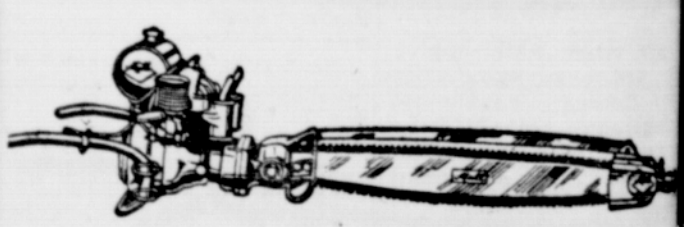
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
