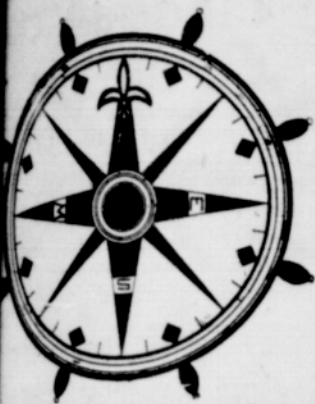
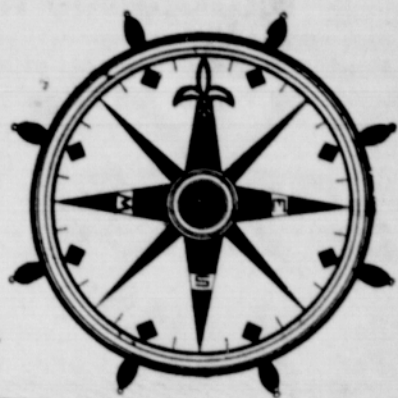

LOCAL P.-T. A. CLINIC DATE WAS POSTPONED

Delay To Doctor Puts Program Behind Of Schedule Planned

Due to conditions beyond control, the P.-T. A. officers, it was necessary to cancel the pre-arranged clinic, sponsored by the P.-T. A., scheduled for last Tuesday, in the offices of Dr. Erickson and Dr. Erickson.

The organization has been notified after the announcement of the clinic, it could have made arrangements elsewhere for the clinic, by moving office.

Eight children of the 33 listed had appointments, two were in the Winchuck area, one six miles north of town, and from up the Chetco, and others who needed immediate medical attention, were examined. Dr. Stevenson examined four for four others.

The two doctors have liberally rendered their services to examine the other 25 pupils-to-be who enroll this fall as private patients during their regular hours without charge. These children were sent cards as soon as possible, naming dates.

The Parents-Teachers Association members made an attempt to stop mothers on their way to clinic, but in an area practically devoid of telephone communication, it was necessary to do so at the door.

The plan was set up so that children would not take more than 10 minutes to each child, with two mothers in the office at a time.

However, Dr. Erickson was delayed at Gold Beach, so that a number of mothers and children were on hand when he arrived.

The association is grateful to the doctors for their assistance, and to mothers and teachers for their co-operation.

103-28 Vote, Tues. Favored Exceeding Six Per Cent Limit

Patrons of School District No. 17, by their vote of 103 to 28, Tuesday evening, sanctioned the district's exceeding the six per cent limitation for operation of the schools of the district. Last year over 300 voted in the third election to exceed the limitation.

Under the new rural school board law, the equalized base for this district was raised from \$10,950.60 to \$29,621.65, which changed the amount in excess of the limitation to \$19,538.20, from a figure twice that high.

Many Patrons Forgetful

It was noted, Tuesday evening as well as the evening before, that the people taking most interest in the local school and its welfare were people who have few or no children attending.

Observers pointed out to the Pilot, late in the evening after polls had closed that only about one-third of the eligible parents voted. The voting list of the district, eligible to vote at such an election is over 700. Tuesday only 133 voted.

The budget as voted Tuesday, will provide funds for the operation of the schools along the line that was stated in the publication of the budget in January of this year.

By virtue of its vote both on Monday, June 14, and on Tuesday, District No. 17 will be given a "conditionally standard" rating until completion of the school buildings, after which it will become standard.

HY. COMMISSION ORDER DROPPED QUICKLY IN AREA

Local Operators Committee Uses Pressure To Rescind Edict

The state highway commission, last Thursday, clamped the lid tight on the load limit of all carrier vehicles on Highway 101, in this area, and a few offenders were assessed fines ranging from \$300 to \$700 in justice court.

An operator's committee, comprised of "Bill" Duggan, Wilson Freeman, Bob Swan, Warren Smith and Fred Fox, telephoned the Salem office of the commission to learn the reason for this sudden and quite expensive edict on the part of the commission. From the grapevine, as most of the committee members remained non-committal, reports come that complaints were signed by local people.

Because of this order, mills of the area were shut down from Thursday until Monday. Trucks bringing in groceries and other provisions for the area were also effected by the new ruling, and for a time seriously threatened the economy of the entire area.

Just how this committee did achieve revoking of the order may never come to light, but early Saturday the lid was lifted and on Monday mills re-opened for work, and trucks again were moving on the highway, loaded to the old limit.
