Coos-Curry Office Is Temporarily Located At Coquille

EUGENE—Formation of a local organization to serve independent lumbermen, loggers, truckers and allied interests in Curry and Coos counties was officially launched last week by the creation of a temporary organizing committee at a meeting at Coquille. Ben A. Bailey, of Myrtle Point, logging operator, was named temporary chairman.

Serving with him are Ivan E. Smalley, as vice-chairman, and R. E. McKeever, as secretary, both of Coquille.

The local group, which has not chosen a final name, will function as a section of the already well-established regional organization serving the independents in western states, Western Forest Industries Association.

Bailey said the very rapid development of lumbering in the two southern coast counties made it increasingly urgent to knit the independents into a local organization to protect their interests which were more and more being threatened by threat of timber monopoly and other hazards.

Ore. Women Raise \$15,000 Of O. S. C. Azalea House Fund

Home Demonstration Agent CORVALLIS—Funds in excess of \$15,000 have been raised by county home extension units for the Azalea House building fund, a project adopted by the state home economics extension council to provide a house of residence for girls at Oregon State College, with preference given, if necessary, to those who are in home economics and who were former 4-H club members.

Decision to defer action construction until more money is raised was made at the annual meeting of the state council at OSC recently. The project was extended into a five-year project so that the major portion of money needed may be raised before construction begins. Amortization costs are to be avoided as much as possible so that the living costs to girls may be kept as low as possible, reported Mrs. Norman Lunde, Portland, state chairman.
