

Siskiyou Fire Training Under Way With Three-day School Given By U. S. F. S.

GRANTS PASS, June 28 (Special to the Pilot)—About thirty-five members of the summer fire protective organization of the Siskiyou forest office in Grants Pass were in general charge of the planning and operation of the camp. The four instructors were Ranger Marshall Stenerson and district assistant Ed Grosh, both of Rand Ranger station; and district assistants George Morey of Cave Junction and Elwin Frye of Powers.

Also at the forest service Illinois valley airport 24 smoke-jumpers were in the midst of an intensive training program under the direction of crew leader Cliff Marshall. The smoke-jumpers were increased this season at the expense of some small ground crews previously employed.

L. L. Colvill, formerly assistant supervisor of the Siskiyou and now an assistant in the division of fire control at Portland, acted as inspector at the guard training camp. Kermit Linstedt, also formerly assistant supervisor at Grants Pass and now assistant regional forester in charge of fire control for region 6 at Portland, was there Wednesday to check on the training program of the smoke-jumpers.

Although there has been practically no fire danger to date, forest service people know from experience that conditions can change rapidly, so the elaborate plans for any bad season which might arise.

A Noorduyn plan is used for jumpers. It has a capacity for a pilot, spotter and four equipped jumpers. Don Moyer is pilot.

Photographs express character and personality. We form opinions of individuals by looking at their pictures, though we may never meet them personally. The shaping and trend of human activity may be seen in the photographs of the actors in the drama of life, as they appear in the pictorial magazines. Suppose we briefly glance at some of the pictures appearing in a recent issue of a news magazine.

The first that attracts our attention is a picture of our defense secretary, James Forrestal. This man carries the responsibility of directing the armed might of this nation. At his command armies, industrial centers, great cities would crumble into dust and ashes and millions of lives would be snuffed out with them. In the discharge of his duty he is sitting for a picture that is stamping its tell-tale lines and expressions upon his countenance so deeply they cannot be concealed.

The next pictures are of two men recently condemned as traitors to our country before a congressional court. Their faces tell the sombre story in a language that worlds would fail to depict.

We are now looking at two Italian laborers standing beneath the hammer and sickle of Communism. One look is enough to reveal the embittered and corded story of their lives and doubtless the lives of their families.

There now appears before our vision a group of men and women of Kalavryta, Greece, mourning for their dead who lie clustered at their feet as they fell when their village had been raided by a band of communist guerrillas.

We turn a page and look at an 18th century public hanging scene in Tyburn, England. A tower, a gibbet and a long line of unhooded human forms dangling from ropes.

Next we pause at the picture of a widowed mother and her child bereft by the bullets of an assassin. At their side lie a long row of dead men and women slain in the rebellion at Bogota, Columbia, at the time of the recent peace conference held there.

A quick look at a noted woman drinking a glass of champagne. Another equally notorious as she appeared after having sued a pictorial magazine for having charged her with rhinoplasty, whatever that is.

The only picture that ever could bring real joy to the heart was that of a ten-year-old boy, who, after long saving of pennies and dimes, bought an old fire engine for \$25. This picture was so clean, so wholesome, and there was such a glow of genuine joy spread all over the face of the lad as he sat in the battered seat of the old engine with his hand on the steering wheel that the longer I looked at it the better I felt. If we really desire a glimpse of what constitutes genuine happiness perhaps one of the best places to look for it is in the face of a child.

Around the world the grim drama goes on and on and it all passes our door in the pictures that are rolling from the printing presses.

Is it not good to give heed to the words of the Divine Master—"And Jesus called a little child unto Him and set him in the midst of them, and said, Verily I say unto you, except ye be converted and become as little children, ye shall not enter the kingdom of heaven."
