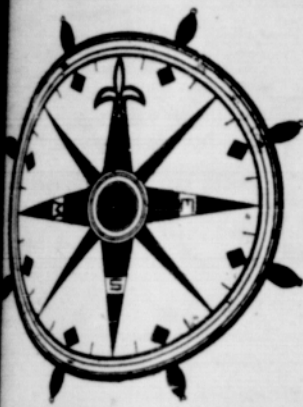
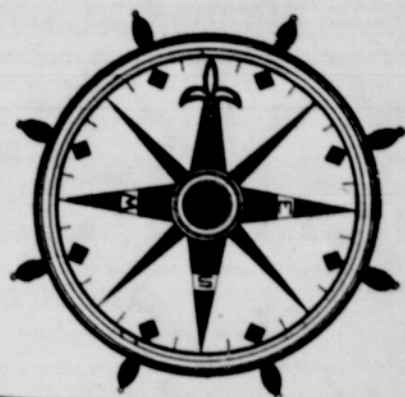

Various Organizations

Starting Sunday, July 11, all
visitors in this vicinity will re-
ceive free Easter lily blossoms in
advance of "Lily Blossom
Time," Howard James told the
Pilot Tuesday, when he placed
the schedule for organizations to
man booths in this work.

in front of the Central building,
Brookings, from which point

More Floats Needed To Complete Lily Blossom Parade, For Sunday, July 18

Interest in the forthcoming lily blossom week has been mani-
fest with some 20-odd individuals and business firms signing up for
floats for the parade, the Pilot, learned, Tuesday. This is below
expectations, as over 40 were in the last year's parade. With but
nine days left, it is expected that a rush may be made early next
week. Explanation for this delay
was said due to many people
having no lily blossoms for de-
corations.

However, if history repeats
itself, the last days, possibly the
day of the parade, any number
of floats will be lined up at the
starting line, with no registra-
tion being made. That happened
last year, and by so doing threw
the judging into a problem.

To aid the judging committee,
people who wish to enter a
float are urged to register, so
a place may be assigned in the
parade.

PROGRAM MADE FOR 2ND ANNUAL "LILY PARADE"

News Reels Will Be
Made of Event; Big
Program In Park

Designed to give the visitor
"the time of his life" the pro-
gram of the forthcoming "Lily
Blossom Time" has been released
by the committee, for informa-
tion of any possible visitors.

While the affair commences
on Saturday, July 17, there will
be no formal program for that
day. All visitors will be taken
on conducted tours of the area,
to view the scenic spots, includ-
ing the many flower fields. At
9:00 p. m., Queen Charlotte will
be crowned in the realm of lilies
at the Harbor Grange hall.

Services for those who care
to attend church will be held at
the various churches of the area
in the morning.

Beginning at 2:00 p. m. the
mammoth lily parade will com-
mence, in Brookings, and will
proceed to Harbor Grange, to
return to Azalea State Park,
where a program of games for
both old and young has been
planned.

A picnic dinner is being plan-
ned for the park, in the evening,
with coffee being furnished by
the lily growers.

Gold Beach band, which has
made many friends in this area,
will furnish music for the entire
affair, Sunday. Topping the eve-
ning festivities will be the fire-
works display at the beach.

Veterans Picnic Is Due Next Sunday

Many Million People Will View Beauties Displayed In Lily Blossom Festival Here

The forthcoming Lily Blossom Week in Brookings will be given
world-wide publicity through news reels and motion pictures, the
Pilot was told Saturday by Howard T. James, secretary of Croft
Lily Growers Association, sponsors of the lily event.

Several motion picture companies, said James, will be here with
cameras to picture the event, and eventually some thirty to fifty
million people will view the local spectacle in their favorite movie
houses when news reels or feature "shorts" will be shown.

In the same interview James told the Pilot to urge local people
to extend themselves in the preparation of their floats so that
the local affair would be given more color. "This affair has grown
until few of us realize the magnitude. It is too much for the aver-
age mind to conceive of the advertising possibilities," James con-
cluded, as he went ahead to tell of plans for the festival.

With but nine days left, much remains to be accomplished, so
every method of co-operation must be made, James urged, to give
this area the boost it rightfully deserves.
