

Chas. A. Ballard Leaves Alaska To Settle In Brookings

Charles A. Ballard, recently of Cordova, Alaska, arrived in this area this week to make his future home. He had been on the Pilot mailing list for the past many months, with view of locating here.

A welder by trade, he is affiliating himself with Brookings Machine Shop, and will use their equipment until his arrives from the north land.

"This country is so much like the southeast part of Alaska that I already feel like I'm at home," he told the Pilot when he had his paper changed from Alaska to Brookings.

Mr. Ballard has been in Alaska most of the time since 1932, having been at work on the Alcan highway, which he described at length to the Pilot.

"Fishing industry in Alaska is poor this year, due to the wrong treatment of the whole affair. Financial control does not lie in Alaska, and this reflects upon every industry," he said.

Granted statehood, Mr. Ballard predicts Alaska will go ahead at a rapid rate. Resources are there but there has never been any long-range development, except by private interests which fight paying taxes which are actually due Alaska.

The bonds will be delivered to the successful bidder in Portland, Oregon.

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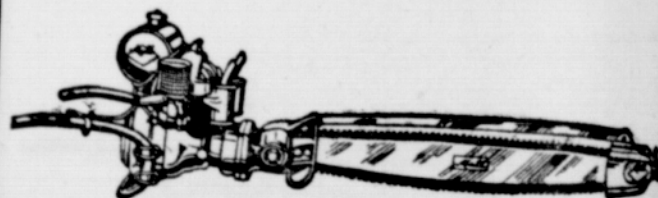
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
