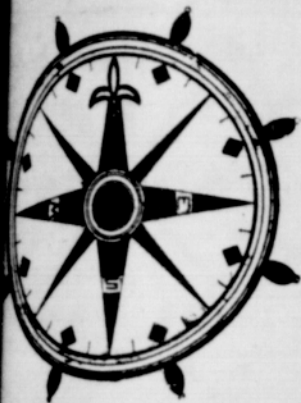
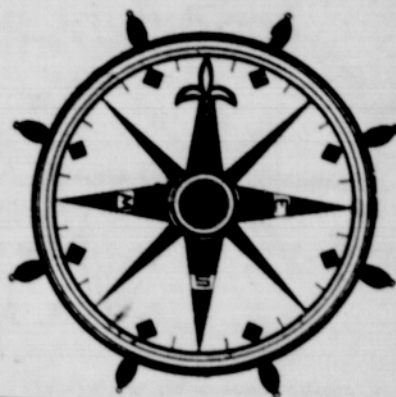

BROOKINGS WATER COMPANY TO GIVEN HEARING, AUGUST 5, ON APPLICATION FOR NEW TARIFF

Report From Public Utilities Commission
Sets Date Of Hearing For Thursday, August
5, at Pine Cone Theatre, Brookings

Hearing, called by the Oregon Public Utilities Commission, will be held Thursday, August 5, at the Pine Cone Theatre, when Brookings Water Company will be called upon to show cause for a new tariff recently submitted to the commission. Cards went out, Monday, telling of the meeting. The time has been set for 10 a. m. July 7, the Brookings Water Company, operating a water utility, is the public utilities commission. In Salem, made application to increase rates presently in effect, and established under tariff No. 2. At the meeting set for the Pine Cone theatre, the water company will appear and bear the burden of showing that the scheduled rates proposed to be established, or increased, or charged, is just and reasonable, and after such hearing the commission shall issue such order, orders, as shall be justified by the facts determined.

1948 LILY BLOSSOM FESTIVAL SET FOR NEXT SATURDAY & SUNDAY WILL NOT BE POSTPONED AGAIN

Survey Shows That Plenty Blossom Will Be
Available For All Floats; Growers Promise
Unlimited Co-operation To Everyone Interested

A comprehensive survey, made by members of the Lily Blossom Time committee, revealed, Sunday, that sufficient lilies would be available for floats, without postponing the lily blossom festival, as was first feared. Prompting this action on the part of the lily festival committee was a reported cancellation of float entries due to what was considered "no available lily blossoms."
