HELLO, THERE:

There are all kinds of weeks throughout the year—in fact there are more special "weeks" than the calendar can hold. However, they are interesting and do give a time for special emphasis.

Next week, July 19-24, has been designated by secretary of agriculture, Chas. F. Brannan, as national home food preservation week. He doesn't mean, however, to do all your food preservation this one week—but rather to make the plan for summer and fall canning, freezing or drying of food for family use in the less abundant seasons. Secretary Brannan says, "Food is still the most important single factor for world peace. We can not afford to let the products of our farms and gardens be wasted. These supplies can be used to maintain the health and vigor of our families and add to total world food supply."

And, on the side, ladies, it will help reduce that enormous food bill to you and keep your family better fed besides. In our office you will find bulletins. If we can be of help to you in any of your canning problems, do let us know. We have a new bulletin from Oregon State Col-

lege on freezing preservation of fruits and vegetables. It has a handy chart which not only tells how to prepare for freezing, but also tells what varieties are best to freeze. Just call or drop us a card (Extension office, at Gold Beach), and we'll be happy to send you a copy.

It's true, it may be mid-July but there's still time to plant some of the garden vegetables.

Extension horticultural specialist Ralph Clark at OSC says any of these vegetable crops can be planted now with reasonable assurance of success. Clark is talking of beets, bush beans, late cabbage, cauliflower, carrots, rutabagas and Swiss chard. These are the vegetable crops that should be planted soon.

Here's a list of later garden vegetables: Lettuce might be planted in late July. You can plant Chinese cabbage from August 1 to 15. Turnips can be planted about August 10. Then, there's spinach. Spinach planted during the last ten days of August should mature in 42 to 60 days. And, Clark points out, it will be ready to set on the table yet this fall. For spring spinach, plant in about Oct. 15.

Mr. Clark is scheduled to come to Curry county Aug. 2, 3 and 4, for district meetings aimed to assist you in any of your garden problems and to bring you the newest in family garden planning, planting and raising. Put these dates on your calendar and plan to attend the one most convenient to you:

August 2—Sixes Grange.

Aug. 3—Court House, at Gold Beach.

Aug. 4—Chetco Grange.

All three meetings will start at 8:00 p. m. Bring the entire family. They will all be interested in the message. We'll like to see more 4-H vegetable garden clubs started this fall.

Co. Service Officer Reports To You:

Editor, Pilot:

At the July meeting of Curry county board of commissioners, I was re-appointed county service officer for the coming year. The office for this veterans work will be at my residence, located on Hwy 101, one mile south of the court house, next to the forest service station.

There is an increasing need for this service to veterans and their families, and such as aiding them to obtain educational aid, G. I. Bill, hospitalization, insurance, pensions, burial expenses, etc.

My aim will be to assist all veterans and their families in filing of the various claims.

As your service officer I'd like to stress the importance of all veterans having their discharges recorded. This will be done cheerfully and at no cost to the veteran by the county clerk.

In a number of hospitalization cases caused by serious accidents where time was a very important factor, no original discharge or certified copy has been available for service verification.

When a veteran loses his original discharge without having it recorded, or a photostatic copy made, he can never obtain the

same full record. In place of obtaining a duplicate copy from Washington he will only receive what is called "Certificate in lieu of discharge," which contains merely official confirmation of military service, with very few details.

A recorded discharge at the county clerk's office is invaluable as a protective measure in case of loss of the original, and a certified copy of the recorded discharge, issued by the county clerk is accepted as next in value to the original discharge papers where proof is necessary.
