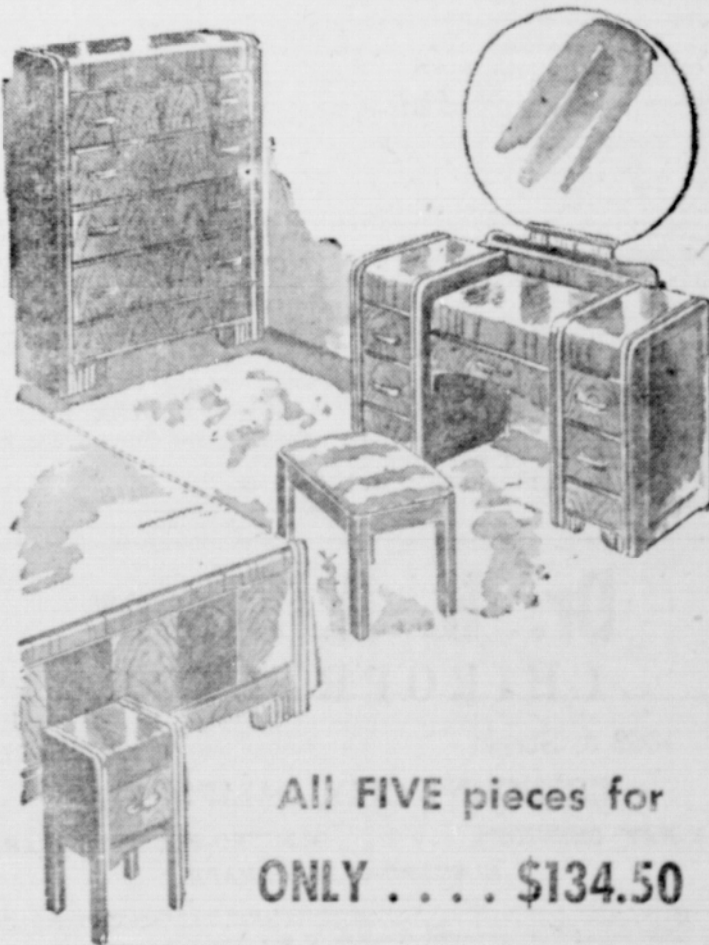
"Flower Girls"
