

CALIFORNIA FAIR REPORTED TO HOLD MANY ATTRACTIONS THIS SUMMER

Puppet Show Will Feature Del Norte County Fair, Set for August 20, 21, and 22, Dates

CRESCENT CITY—A popular entertainment feature to be shown in a free attraction at the Del Norte County Fair, August 20 to 22, inclusive, will be the variety puppet acts presented by the famous Three Bee Puppeteers.

During the last three years, thousands of California and Arizona audiences, ranging from tiny-tot age to grandpas and grandmas, have laughed and thrilled to the "little people", the puppets presented by the Three Puppeteers. No age group has failed to respond to the antics of Clippo, the clown; Bobo, and his trained penguins Pete and Pat; Panch and his undisciplined horse, Hijo; G. Raffy and his nemesis, Leander, the most ferociously gentle lion in captivity who only wants to play, but simply succeeds in frightening everyone; and the amazing puppet skeleton who never fails to startle and amuse the audience.

The Three Bee Puppeteers are Bill and Bette Gerard and their two boys of San Diego. Playing fairs, festivals and expositions during the summer and fall, they go into each winter season with engagements at schools and clubs to bring the appeal and artistry of the puppet theatre to as many as possible.

The Gerard's have designed and built their entire equipment—a miniature theatre complete with everything but the audience. Besides many other regular and popular puppet acts, the Three Bees always have new puppets and the necessary props, scripts and other paraphernalia in various stages of completion.

As an added attraction at the fair, continuous free color movies will be presented between each puppet show, featuring musicals, cartoons and the story of what goes into making up your county fair and how it is possible.

The Three Bee Puppeteers are being presented as a free attraction on the fair grounds, through the courtesy of the fair management.

A bigger and better agricultural and livestock exposition, with horse, cattle, poultry and rabbit shows. Parade of the champions, thrill and special shows are being arranged, a Del Norte county champion horse-shoe pitching tournament is already attracting much interest and a fair photographer's contest with cash awards.

Booths for the commercial exhibits will be housed this year in the commercial building and a warning has been issued by McClure that only a very few booths are even now available for this season's show. Domestic arts, horticultural, floricultural along with lumbering products will be featured extensively in their various departments.

Nelson also laced out a single, and double at bat, as did newcomer "Chuck" Griffith. Leo Spangler collected the only other extra-base blow, also a double, and made a fine one-handed catch of a hump-back liner back of second base. Bob Perkins also appeared in uniform.
