Standard Time, on the 24th day of July, 1948, and immediately thereafter publicly opened by the District School Board of School District No. 17, Curry County, Oregon, at School House, for an issue of bonds of said School District in the amount of ONE HUNDRED TWELVE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$112,000.00); said bonds to be dated August 1, 1948, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of Seven Thousand Dollars (\$7,000.00) on the first day of February in each of the years, 1952 to 1956, inclusive, at the rate of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.00) on the first day of February in each of the years 1957 to 1960, inclusive, and at the rate of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000.00) on the first day of February in each of the years 1961 to 1965, inclusive, provided that all bonds maturing after February 1, 1956, are subject to call and redemption on February 1, 1956, and on any interest paying date thereafter, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of not to exceed six per cent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually. 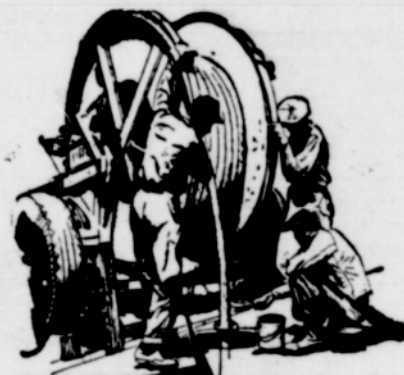

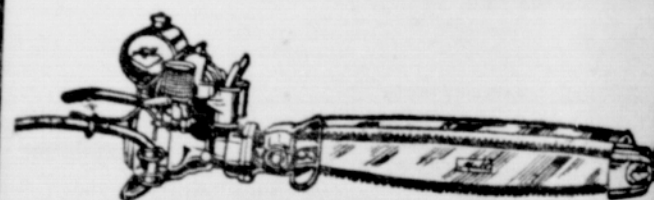
